MENUS

The housewife in search of new dishes to tempt the family palate will find a wealth of possibilities in the hearty winter vegetables.

Although kale is not as rich in iron as spinach, it makes an excellent, inexpensive substitute. Turnips and parsnips supply bulk, always important in the diet, but especially so when much meat is used. While these vegetables are poor in protein and are not a rich source of minerals or vitamins, these elements are present in small amounts.

Onions, beets and carrots are fair sources of iron and vitamin. Cabbage is rich in iron and vitamin A, B, and C. These vegetables can be used raw if they are grated or finely minced and furnished the essential "staid a day" very cheaply.

Since the nutrition experts' rule today is "two vegetables a day besides potatoes" it behooves the cook to find interesting ways to add the inexpensive and indispensable winter vegetables to her menu.

It should be remembered that the coarse root vegetables should be cooked in a large quantity of water to prevent burning when cooked, using one teaspoonful to a table. Salt should be added when the vegetables are about half cooked, using one teaspoonful to a part of water. These simple rules do much to increase the palatability of the vegetables.

Carrot timbales are a particularly good dish for luncheon, since the addition of eggs adds protein to the dish.

Carrot Timbales
Two cups-cooked carrot pulp, 2 eggs, 1/2 cup milk, 1 tablespoon butter, 1 teaspoon salt, 2 teaspoons grated onion, 1/8 teaspoon pepper.

Cook the carrots and put through vegetable ricer. Beat eggs well and add milk, butter and seasoning. Add to carrot pulp and beat well. Pour into buttered molds and place in a pan of hot water. Bake in moderate oven until firm to the touch. It will take about 45 minutes to bake the timbales. Remove from molds and serve with white sauce.
