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Officials said they hoped to defeat any attempt to return the suspect to California to face charges of wrecking and robbing a Southern Pacific train.

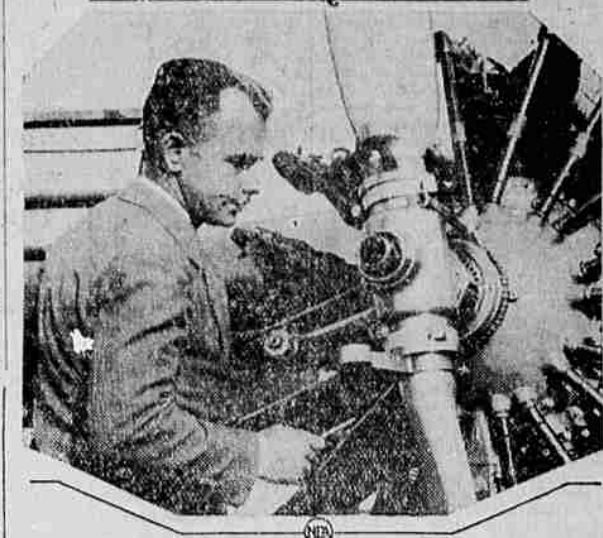
GALES, SNOW SHROUD FATE OF VESSELS

Reversible Propeller Acts as Brake



This newly perfected reversible airplane propeller, displayed for the first time at the Western Aircraft Exposition at Los Angeles, introduces many new possibilities to flying, particularly in combat maneuvers. By changing the pitch of the blades in flight, an aerial brake is brought into effect and by reversing the blades the machine may taxi backward on the ground. The propeller can also give the plane a quicker takeoff and faster climbing and cruising speed. Note the chain drive pitch controller, adjusted from the cockpit, which is being examined by A. K. McLeod, one of the owners.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Dec. 2 (AP)—Clarence C. Price, Varney air mail pilot, injured late Saturday when his plane struck a tower of the Interstate bridge while feeling his way through a dense fog, succumbed to his injuries last night. Price served with the American air forces during the World war.

WILD RIDE ENDS IN DEATH
WHITTIER, Cal., Dec. 2 (AP)—The story of a wild ride with death today will be told to a coroner's jury at an inquest over the bodies of six young persons who early yesterday were killed at a grade crossing near here when their small automobile was struck by a Santa Fe passenger train and hurled, a mass of twisted wreckage, against the concrete base of a wig-wag signal.

Sheriff's deputies investigating the fatal crash said the party was returning to Los Angeles from a Saturday night dance at the J. S. Baker ranch in Santa Fe right, and apparently an attempt had been made to beat the train to the crossing. All but one occupant of the small coupe was killed instantly.

The dead: William R. Deford, 21, Los Angeles high school player, died en route to Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Centralia, Wash. Edwin C. Bibe, 23, Mt. Heir, 19, and Mrs. Audra, all of Los Angeles. 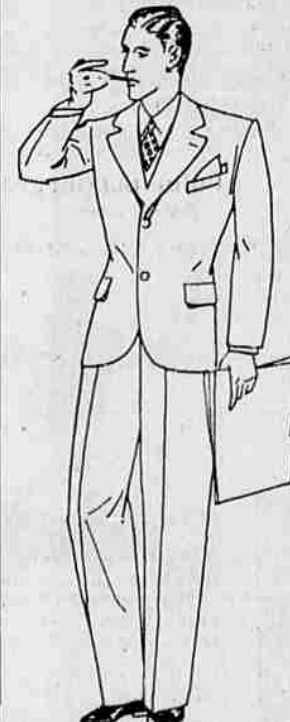
