Hunting Horses On Range Areas Near Wallowa

WALLOWA, Ore. (Special).—Some of the farmers of this community have been riding in the summer range areas hunting up some of their horses grazed there during the summer. E. H. Sherod and a few others, who have horses in the north woods and Mud Creek sections, took their saddle horses to the Glenn Talley farm on Dry Creek Sunday evening where they made a camp and spent several days riding in that section. Bruce Fisher and Clyde Hoxson, farmers of the Leap community, also have out a considerable number of horses which they have not gathered yet and expect to commence riding during the coming week. The stock which has been recently gathered in is said to be in good condition.

The weather in this community continues to be nice for this season of the year with warm sunshine during the day. Some rather severe freezing occurred here during part of last week, however, during the past few days it has been much warmer with only light freezing at night. The continued open weather is saving stockmen of this community much feed and a condition which is greatly welcomed by nearly everyone. Stockmen feel that the feed supplies on hand are ample for a normal winter and should the weather remain open for a part of this month many feel that it will not be likely to last longer in the spring than that of last year in which case the actual feeding season would not be longer than four months. The roads in all parts of the county are said to be in the best of condition and are a great help to those who have much heavy hauling to do. Truckmen who are engaged in hauling logs to the mill here from some of the small logging jobs going on in various parts of the community say that they never saw road conditions better for this kind of work. Only a small amount of fall plowing has been done in this end of the valley compared with what is usually accomplished by this time. Nearly all of the farmers in the valley who did any plowing found it necessary to irrigate the fields before they could plow and where the ground contained moisture the severe weather of two weeks ago from the soil to a depth of several inches, putting an end to the plowing there. No plowing or sowing was done in the dry farming areas because of the ground being so dry and hard. The fall rain which has been growing nicely since the weather has turned warmer.
