Egg and Butter Prices Weaker; Jap Oranges In

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 5 (AP)—Egg and butter prices were both slightly weaker today, but no changes were reported in prices. At Seattle butter had a decline of one cent, but other markets were undisturbed. Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the United States department of agriculture says: Trading in fresh fruits and vegetables this week appears to be confined largely to the staple products as lettuce, cabbage, potatoes, etc. Movement of "fancy" fresh fruits, as tomatoes, peppers and sweet potatoes is slow. California tomatoes are barely steady at \$2.75 to \$3.00 per lug of ripe packed stock. Peppers continue to advance to as high as 25c per lb. to retailers, but movement is very limited. First arrivals of Japanese oranges, imported from Japan, are arousing considerable interest this morning. Opening prices to retailers range from \$2.00 to \$2.25 per bundle of two boxes, containing about 8 dozen. Farmers' store pits are well filled with carrots, and the last few days have witnessed heavy hauling to commercial storage on the wholesale market, in anticipation of possible scarcity later in the winter, which will make carlot shipping profitable. With current supplies so heavy, prices are low at present.
