State Chamber To Settle Area When Improved

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 5 (AP)—W. G. Ide, manager of the Oregon state chamber of commerce, Wednesday said that if the federal government would spend the \$500,000 necessary to complete the Stanfield reclamation project, the state chamber could, within six months, place an adequate number of settlers on the land.

Ide's statement was in answer to the assertion of Dr. Edward Mead, commissioner of reclamation, that a furnishing fund of \$50,000 to aid new settlers is necessary to assure successful operation on the project. Ide said the state chamber would place on the land would have a minimum capital of \$2,000.

While land on the Stanfield project is as high a government production rating as any in the country, existing facilities are inadequate to supply sufficient water, he said. The \$500,000 asked for by the government would be used for enlarging the main canal and replacing wooden flumes.

There are 5,300 acres in the Stanfield project, the secretary said, but only 3,000 acres are under cultivation. There are 42 resident owners and 16 tenant farmers on the project. EX-GOVERNOR HART, AGED 68, PASSES AWAY

TACOMA, Wash., Dec. 5 (AP)—Former Governor Louis F. Hart, aged 68, died peacefully here last night. The end came without warning.

The former governor had been in a local hospital for four days. He was suffering from a diabetic condition. The immediate cause of his death, according to attending physicians, was a stroke of apoplexy.

In 1912 he was elected lieutenant governor and again in 1916. He assumed the office of acting governor when Governor Ernest Lister collapsed on Feb. 12, 1919. He served two years of Lister's term and was himself elected seventh governor of the state in 1920. Since completion of his term of office he had taken no active part in politics and has lived a retired life here with the exception of his recent election to the presidency of the Washington State Good Roads association last October.

He is best remembered as governor, able from his simplification of the state's administrative machinery and the consequent financial economies, for his intensive efforts in forwarding the hard-surfaced road program of the state and in building up the dairy herds at the state penal and egyptiary institutions. Under his direction those herds became self-supporting and also the source of a large quantity of high grade breeding cattle for dairy farmers.

Shortage of Rain Worries Stockmen

BAKER, Ore., Dec. 5—The continued fair weather with its lack of precipitation has dried up pastures and ranges throughout the county, causing livestock producers to start feeding their stock earlier than usual. County Agent Roger Morse announced today: "The county agent added that there is a danger of alfalfa being frozen. The weather this winter is similar to that of 1924, when considerable alfalfa was frozen. Mr. Morse said there is some feeling of uneasiness among the farmers because of the danger. Early feeding is especially necessary in the dairy business, however, but 'thinker' county has enough hay to last it through the winter unless we have especially severe weather. 'Things don't look too good, but they may turn out all right,' Morse averred.

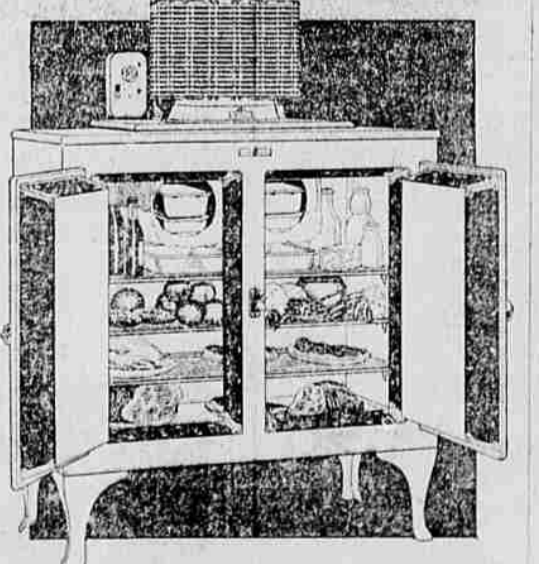
