BUTTER AND EGG PRICES MARKING TIME

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 11 (AP)—Egg and butter quotations were both marking time, but with an apparent undertone of weakness. Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland News Bureau of the United States department of agriculture says: Cauliflower shipments are increasing again, almost to mid-season volume, with 8 cars billed Monday. Heavy shipments from California are resulting in weaker eastern markets, and today's carlot sales are showing much lower prices.

Good carrots and turnips are scarce, and are commanding a premium. Many current offerings are of poor quality, with some worm damage. Owing to the heavy rains, spinach is muddy, difficult to cut, and good clean stock is scarce and higher priced today.

Cabbage supplies are liberal; whereas lighter crops were unofficially reported a week ago; and prices are rather low. Some extra fancy apples, carefully graded and wrapped for late winter use, are showing unusually weak keeping qualities. Maturity and even breakdown is occurring, necessitating prompt movement into consumption.

Wheat Drops 2 Cents Today In Chicago Market

CHICAGO, Dec. 11 (AP)—Lively tumbling down of wheat prices today carried the market to more than 12c a bushel under last week's top level. About the only buying support for wheat came from previous sellers who were in a position to collect profits. Scantiness of export clearances of wheat and flour both from the Atlantic seaboard and the Gulf of Mexico as well as sharp losses in quotations at Liverpool and Buenos Aires, appeared to have staggered friends of higher prices for at least the time being.

Wheat closed unsettled, 2 1/2 to 3 1/2c a bushel below yesterday's finish. Corn closed 1/2c to 3/4c down, oats 1/2c to 1c off, and provisions unchanged to a setback of 10c.

Stocks Reactionary In Street Today

NEW YORK, Dec. 11 (AP)—The stock market turned reactionary just before the close today when heavy selling developed in several of the so-called pivotal industrials and carried them down 1 to nearly 3 points below yesterday's closing quotations. Most of the early gains which ran from 2 to 13 points in several of the public utilities, oils and specialties, were cut down, or wiped out. United States Steel common sold down 4 1/2 points to 17 1/2, closing at 17 1/2, which contrasts with an early high of 18 1/2. Total sales approximated 2,900,000 shares.
