Local Churches Are Preparing For Christmas

Cantatas, Plays, Special Programs for Children to Be Given During the Month.

Church lead
The Christmas spirit has settled over La Grande churches in earnest this week and nearly every house of worship in the city is making plans for the presentation of cantatas, or plays, or special Christmas programs for the children.

Mrs. A. L. Richardson, director of the Presbyterian Ladies Triad choir, and the quartet of mixed voices, announces there is in preparation a sacred concert in keeping with the Christmas period, to be presented by the choir and quartet on Sunday evening, Dec. 29, at 7:30 o'clock. The program will consist of numbers by the choir and quartet, interspersed with solos, duets, trios, sextets and other groupings of voices.
