Thomas Mannix On The Witness Stand

SALISBURY, Ore., Dec. 14 (AP)—Direct examination of Thomas Mannix, defendant in disbarment proceedings here, was completed by Attorney Evan Reames of the prosecution at 10:30 today. Cross-examination by Mannix attorney, Frank J. Connergan, was brief. Mannix was excused subject to recall.

In testimony yesterday Mannix gave as his reason for beginning a second Alvinne suit, which was in the federal court, was to get the Wenman endowment fund out of the control of George Joseph.
