Army Football Squad En Route To West Coast

WEST POINT, N. Y., Dec. 15.—(AP)—The Army football squad, the strongest ever, is en route today on the longest trip ever taken by the gridiron warriors of the military academy. They are due to reach Galveston, Ill., this afternoon on the first leg of the trip to Palo Alto, Cal., where they will encounter Stanford in the final game of the season, Dec. 28.

The departure of the "West Point special" a 12-car train which provides every possible comfort for a traveling football team, was made a ceremonial occasion yesterday when the academy's senior football coach, Major General W. H. Smith, gave permission for the cadets to give final vocal encouragement to the departing squad. General Smith previously had ruled that the cadets could not be present at the departure on account of examinations, but he relaxed the ruling to permit 500 who were freed most of the afternoon to be present. The arrival of the train at Galveston this afternoon will be another important occasion. The players, officials and others who bring the party to a total of 140 members, are to be the guests of the city. They will be escorted to Knox Field for practice. While the team is drilling, a reception is to be held in honor of General Smith and his staff officers at Knox.

BALTIMORE, Ill., Dec. 19 (AP)—Winter's fury, which slowed up traffic throughout the middle-west, spoiled the plans of Army's football team for a good workout here today. The team, en route to California for a game with Stanford, Dec. 28, was almost three hours behind schedule coming to Chicago. It had been planned to arrive here at 2:30 p. m. for a good workout on Knox field.

TWO TIE FOR LEADERSHIP IN BILLIARDS

DETROIT, Dec. 19 (AP)—Erwin Rudolph and Ralph Greenleaf will play off a tie tonight for the world's pocket billiards championship. Greenleaf defeated Rudolph by 125 to 79 in ten innings last night. Each has had six victories and one defeat in the tournament.

Greenleaf was the superior to Rudolph under the severe strain. He broke away with a run of 89 in the third inning but this advantage soon was cut down when Rudolph replied with 54 in his half. A duel of safety followed with a few scratches thrown in. Rudolph began to feel the strain and three times during the match he missed on easy shots. Greenleaf, on the other hand, was confident and careful. He played with plenty of skill and self-assurance.

During this run of 89 it seemed certain that Greenleaf was going to run out the game and that the final score would be 125 to 89. On his ninth shot with the seven ball in the corner at the foot of the table, he overcut the ball in an effort to set position for the break on the 12. He got the position but missed the seven.

Rudolph made the 13, then ran down and got fine position behind the seven. He jockeyed the ball and the cue ball ricocheted up the table, crashed into the bunched and he was off on his run that terminated at 54 when he failed on an easy shot in the side. It was a miss just as easy on the seven ball in the second inning that halted Rudolph after running eight.

FEW TITLE TILTS DURING THE YEAR

Excitement Below Par in Fight Racket—Climb of Sharkey Notable.

Neil (Associated Press Sports Writer) NEW YORK (AP)—For all that the ballyhoo was turned on in full blast, only a half dozen championship fights, two involving the shift of crowns, contributed any excitement to the 1929 ring campaign. Otherwise the year of flatcuffs was chiefly notable for the death of Tex Rickard, the retirement of Jack Dempsey, the subsequent rise of Jack Sharkey as the foremost American heavyweight contender and a sharp diminishment of New York's hold upon the prize attractions. Boston, Detroit, Chicago, Los Angeles and in a measure Cleveland and St. Louis moved up to outbid Gotham in many instances for the plums of the pugilistic tree.

"Hat" Wins Title

Young Christopher "Hat" Bakulin, a home town pride, punched out a 15 round decision over Andre Rouste, gallant little Frenchman, to win the featherweight championship at Hartford, Conn., Sept. 23.

Most sensational of the foreign heavyweights was Max Schmelling who capped a string of victories with a nine round knockout of Johnny Risko Feb. 1 and a 15 round victory over Paulino Uzcudun June 15.

Tommy Loughran retired from the light heavyweight throne following title tests in which he defeated Mickey Walker, the middleweight king, in Chicago March 23 and soundly whipped Jimmy Braddock Sept. 2.

Loughran's graduation to the heavyweight ranks brought him nothing but a lot of attention and a three-round knockout at the hands of Jack Sharkey, the big, bruising brawler from Boston.

The National Boxing association declared Mickey Walker's 149 pound title vacant Sept. 17 because of the toy bulldog's failure to defend the crown. Mickey promptly stepped out and gave Ace Hudlind, leading contender, a thorough whipping in a title test in Los Angeles Oct. 27.

Sammy Mandell successfully defended his lightweight title against Tony Cassano in Chicago, Aug. 1, but lost to McLarin when he tried the welterweight ranks later.

The most sensational youngsters of the year appeared in the lightweight and featherweight divisions. Al Singer, sleek haired Bronx Jewish lad, stirred the memories of Henry Leonard among the faithful with a string of sensational knockouts.

Chocolate Wins

The other star of the season, flashy "Keed" Chocolate, Cuban negro, gave away considerable poundage and defeated Singer in a 15 round duel at the Polo Grounds. The lightweight division gained

DUSKY CUBAN WINS BATTLE FROM PETRONE

NEW YORK, Dec. 19 (AP)—Kid Chocolate, dusky Cuban featherweight, now can go back home for Christmas with the knowledge that he has met and overcome his strongest opponent since he dropped of Al Singer last spring. He also has attracted some 20,000 fans as contributors to the Christmas fund of the Fifth Avenue boys association.

The Cuban Keed met some stiff opposition from Dominic Petrone, of New York, the biggest and toughest opponent he has encountered in some time, last night. But after a few rounds he came through to add one more triumph to his long list. Petrone, with a three pound weight advantage and a couple of inches in reach, battled Chocolate to a standstill through the first two or three rounds of their ten round battle at the Coliseum last night but wilted under the Keed's merciless hammering and escaped a knockout by a stiff margin. Only his stout heart kept him from going down in the closing rounds when Chocolate hit him almost as he pleased then stood back and dared Petrone to try to hit his face.

Fred Fulton Will Attempt Comeback

ST. PAUL, Minn., Dec. 19 (AP)—Fred Fulton, who was fighting in the heavyweight division during Jess Willard's regime as champion, is training for a comeback attempt. "The Minnesota Plasterer," barred by the Minnesota state boxing commission several years ago, has been reinstated to good standing, and is preparing himself to try again.
