The price of linseed oil, both raw and boiled, has been reduced a gallon by a leading dealer.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the United States department of agriculture says:

Continued rains have greatly curtailed harvesting of local vegetable crops, as spinach, carrots, beets, etc. Unharvested stocks are diminishing; however, limited receipts can be expected until a freeze-up occurs. Cauliflower receipts continue fairly liberal.

Movement of both potatoes and onions continues very slow. In common with Idaho and Yakima valley shipping points, and Chicago and most other eastern terminal markets, the potato market is dull, and barely steady, although little or no price declines are noted yet. Cloudy weather, unsuitable for best house growth, is responsible for a scarcity of tomatoes and cucumbers from this source.

Total unloads of only 3 carloads of all fruits and vegetables, marks the lightest volume in many weeks.
