HOOD RIVER, Ore., Dec. 22 (AP)—A complete course of the fruit industry of the Hood River district including a detail record of the number of trees, variety and age, will be undertaken by County Agent A. L. Markle. The project has the support of the growers or horticulturists, traffic associations and chamber of commerce.

In announcing the course, Markle stated that every important fruit district in Washington and Oregon except the Hood River section has taken a census. He predicted that records of the number and age of trees would be valuable as a guide for future plantings.

In addition there are eight promising candidates from the 1922 freshmen squad, all over six feet.

### PARADISE, Cal., Dec. 22 (AP)—Horton Smith, who yesterday won the title of champion golfer, today was the smiling possessor of another golf glory.

He won the annual Pasadena tournament, which was the first of a series of professional events of the California Island annual, the 21-year-old professional scored up his spectacular year's conquest of the golf courses by finishing in a card of 286, six strokes ahead of hard fighting rival professional.

Gov. Norblad comes to the governor's chair from a life that has seen much of hardship. As a small boy he was brought to America by his parents from Sweden. They settled near Grand Rapids, Mich., where his father was a stone mason.

He married Miss Edna Cates, a Michigan girl, prior to 1909. He served as district attorney of Teller county, Michigan and in that year moved to Astoria. A year before he had established a friend in the city at the mouth of the Columbia river and became enthralled with the country. A year later he returned.

The new chief executive has been president of the Astoria chamber of commerce, a member of the school board several times, city attorney and served five regular and two special sessions in the state senate. Governor Norblad is a Presbyterian and is a member of several lodges.

### DALLAS, Ore., Dec. 22 (AP)—

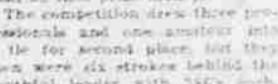

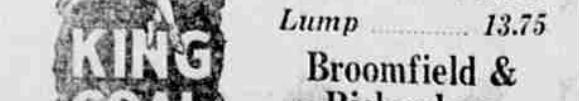
