25,000,000 to 30,000,000 bushels over the official estimate. Taking the higher figure, however, and allowing for the carry-over indicated, the amount of wheat available for export from Argentine in 1930 will be less than half of the amount shipped out during 1929. Based upon the lighter official estimates the world's wheat crop outside of Russian and China now appears to be around 565,000,000 bushels below last season's harvest. This reduction, however, is partially offset by an increase of nearly 200,000,000 bushels in the carry-over of old wheat at the beginning of the season. Marketings to date have been large and market stocks have reached record amounts and have tended to offset the influence of the smaller total supply. Export demand improved somewhat during the week but shipments from the principal exporting countries are nearly 100,000,000 bushels smaller for the season to date than during the same period last year and reflect a large utilization of native wheats in Europe. Germany has placed a higher duty on United States wheat effective January 15. When the basic price of native wheat falls below about \$1.62 1/2 per bushel a duty of about 62c per bushel becomes effective. However, Germany is expected to buy liberal quantities of foreign wheat during the next six months.

Domestic cash wheat markets generally followed the advance in future prices, which have now regained most of the decline which took place earlier in the month. Demand, however, continues of only moderate volume but is about sufficient to absorb the limited offerings of the various classes of wheat. Soft winter wheat prices advanced around 10c per bushel along with other classes of wheat. Pacific coast wheat markets held firm with prices 4c to 5c higher at Portland and Seattle. Quotations in California markets, however, were practically unchanged because of the slow demand for both milling and feed wheat. Receipts of wheat at Pacific northwestern markets were only of moderate volume and demand continued rather dull. The advance in eastern and foreign markets was the principal strengthening influence and cash prices were up 4c to 5c compared with a week ago. Export sales totaling about 650,000 bushels were reported to the United Kingdom during the week at Portland but export bids from the Orient were still below current prices. On December 27 Big Bend blue stem hard white was quoted at Portland at \$1.53, soft and western white at \$1.25, hard winter, northern spring and western red at \$1.23 1/2, basis No. 1 sacked, delivered Portland.

Receipt of a large consignment of green peas from the Imperial valley was reported by a leading produce company today. The wholesale price is 15c a pound. Cauliflower was plentiful and of excellent quality at 75c a crate wholesale. Cabbages were easier at 15.25. There was also a weaker tone in the onion market. Butter prices were stationary. Egg supplies have increased and the underdone was somewhat weaker.

### Green Peas Arrive From California

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### Wheat Prices Advance Sharply During Week, Due to Argentine Report

WASHINGTON, Dec. 29 (AP)—Grain markets strengthened materially during the week ending December 28, and wheat prices advanced sharply, influenced principally by an official confirmation of the wheat crop in Argentine, according to the Weekly Grain Review of the United States Bureau of Agricultural Economics. Food grains were firmer with wheat but demand was of limited volume and prices advanced only slightly, although offerings were not large. Rice was sharply higher, largely in sympathy with the price advance of the major food grains. The rice market was firmer.  
An official estimate placing the Argentine crop at only 742,000,000 bushels was the principal strengthening factor in the wheat market during the week. Should this estimate be borne out only about 65,000,000 bushels would be available for export, excluding the old crop carry-over, estimated by the trade at about 1,000,000 bushels. During the last two years, however, the total supply in Argentine has been considerably in excess of the world's official estimate. Trade estimates of this season's crop are around
