HOOVER'S FIRST YEAR SEES MANY TASKS STARTED

theory that the senate's reservations had been met, but this was not submitted to the senate for some time and a fight loomed after which our adherence probably will be ratified.

The beginnings of what may be far-reaching reforms have been made in regard to the vexing and long-standing problem of law enforcement. The president appointed a committee of extraordinary high grade under the chairmanship of George Wickersham, primarily in response to widespread dissatisfaction with prohibition enforcement conditions but also to investigate enforcement and observance of all laws. Dealing directly with prohibition he has recommended the transfer of the enforcement job from the treasury to the department of justice and the question is now before congress.

Acting in the wake of the stock market crash and anxious to restore public confidence as well as to spur business as much as possible, Hoover summoned leaders of business and industry to Washington in November and talked "business as usual" to them. He warned against wage reduction and urged all justifiable programs of expansion with the promise that the government would join in the general movement. The effect of Hoover's emergency measures cannot be judged with exactitude, but he believes that confidence was reestablished and that a large amount of unemployment and suffering was prevented.

Business Recovery Being Hastened
Thanks largely to Hoover, there has also appeared the national business survey conference under the chairmanship of Julius H. Barnes, which recently appointed an executive committee including a score of America's most important men in business and industry. The committee will recommend courses of action for the stabilization of business. Here, too, one finds significant beginnings.

These have been the year's most important developments from the Hoover standpoint, although one might mention various other Hoover beginnings in the handling of problems such as the appointment of his commissions to study the public lands and child welfare problems.

But the test of the administration has hardly begun. In most cases the executive must act in conjunction with congress and in-

asmuch as congress has been tied up and tangled up mostly with the tariff there has been no chance to get going.

Meanwhile, however, congress has done some things on its own. That is the senate, has, for the house is content to take orders from the administration. The Caraway committee began a rather thorough-going exposure of lobbying here which even caught Senator Bingham of Connecticut in its toils and another senate committee began but never completed an investigation of William B. Shearer's activities at the Geneva naval conference. The Shearer investigation probably prevented any repetition at London.

The Senate Interstate Commerce committee, with Cosens of Michigan as chairman, began and is continuing its investigation of the "power trust" and the "radio trust." The investigation is supposed to contain considerable "dynamite" which may or may not be allowed to explode.

After three years the senate last month dismissed the famous Vane case by refusing to allow the senator-elect from Pennsylvania to take his seat.

Grid Coaches Are Opposed To Rule Changes

NEW YORK, Dec. 31 (AP)—The football rules will stand as they are if the national football coaches association has its way.

By an informal vote of about 4 to 1 the coaches, meeting here in annual session yesterday, rejected three changes in the code recommended by the association's rules committee, headed by Glenn Thistlewaite, University of Wisconsin coach.

The most drastic change would have abolished the point after touchdown, another suggested classifying penalties so that if two fouls were called on the same play, one major and the other minor, instead of the ball reverting to its original position the difference between the two penalties would be assessed. The other proposed change would have given a team in possession of the ball within five yards of the sideline the option of putting it in play 15 yards from the sideline with the loss of a down.

All three suggestions died a rapid death when H. W. P. Brown of Brown, pointing out that the modification of the rules now was practically complete, moved what no change in the rules be made. The decision, by upraised hands, showed a large majority opposed to the changes.

Officers elected were: president, William A. Alexander, Georgia Tech; vice president, J. F. Meehan, New York university; second vice president, Clarence W. Spears, Minnesota; Secretary-treasurer, W. H. Cowell, New Hampshire. Robert C. Zupke, Illinois; Glenn S. Wiggins, Stanford; and J. L. Sutherland, Pittsburgh, were named to sit as an advisory committee with the football rules committee.

Pittsburgh And Trojans Ready For Jan. 1 Game

PASADENA, Cal., Dec. 31 (AP)—College football's capital, shifted to this far southwestern section of the country, hummed with activity today as the undefeated Pittsburgh Panthers and Southern California Trojans romped through the final workouts preliminary to the inter-sectional classic that will bring these powerful eastern and western rivals together New Year's day.

Not since 1924, when Stanford and Notre Dame shared the annual Tournament of Roses plum, has a forthcoming contest so caught the fancy of the football faithful. The Rose Bowl, seating around 70,000 persons, has been sold out for days. It is the first time in five years that tickets have been placed at the premium where seat-holders have been able to mobilize their forces.

Thirty-three strong, the Pittsburgh warrior reached the scene of combat yesterday and dug their cleats into the same turf where two years ago they lost to Stanford, 7-6. Lighter than the Trojans, the Pitt boys impressed onlookers with their gridiron thoroughness. Dash and pep is woven into every move of the invading touchdown-seekers. Rather cool weather brought a smile from Coach Sutherland. It will suit Jack perfectly if the sun takes a vacation until after the first of the year.

CASANOVA IS LOSER IN HIS FINAL BATTLE

EUREKA, Cal., Dec. 31 (AP)—Johnny Casanova, hero of many a gridiron battle, lost his fight against death here last night.

The 21-year-old Santa Clara university athlete succumbed in St. Joseph's hospital last night from injuries received in an automobile accident near here Christmas day. Despite several blood transfusions young Casanova refused a truce and at midnight the last sacrament of the Catholic church was administered by the Rev. Father Minogue of Eureka.

At his bedside were his parents, his three sisters and his brother Leonard, who was slightly injured in the same Christmas night accident.

Joe Deschager, major league baseball pitcher and brother-in-law of the injured youth, and Delph Timmerman, University of California tackle and his gridiron rival, each furnished a pint of blood which for a time kept him alive. Casanova, starting in football, baseball, basketball and track, was rated as one of the best athletes ever produced by Humboldt county. He was in his senior year at Santa Clara and was to have joined the Seattle baseball club of the Pacific Coast league next season.

Wheat Unsettled And Higher Today

CHICAGO, Dec. 31 (AP)—Helped by announcement that world commercial stocks of wheat show a smaller total than a year ago, wheat values scored a decided upturn early today. There were also advances that consumer demand at Liverpool is enlarging, especially for United States winter wheat. Opening at 1/2 to 3/4 advance, Chicago wheat later showed material further gains. Corn and oats were irregular, with corn starting at 1/2 to 3/4 up, and subsequently holding near to the initial figures. Provisions tended upward. Wheat closed unsettled, 1/2 to 1 1/2 a bushel higher than yesterday's finish.

Corn closed 1 1/2 to 1 1/4 net decline to 1/2 advance, oats 1/2 to 1/4 up, and provisions unchanged to a setback of 10c.

MENUS

By Sister Mary
A bread pudding rightly made is one of those desserts which is appetizing and nutritious and may be given to children as well as grown-ups.

A bread pudding which uses the correct proportion of bread to eggs and milk is not a stiff or gummy mass so often served under the name, but a delicate, custard-like confection.

Slow baking is essential for the milk and egg combination. Hasty baking will make the pudding watery and unappetizing.

Since bread puddings are usually served warm, they are ideal for winter weather.

The following chocolate bread pudding is delicious served with hard sauce.

Chocolate Bread Pudding
One and one-fourth cups stale bread crumbs, 2 cups scalded milk, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 square bitter chocolate, 2 eggs, 1-8 teaspoon salt, 1-2 teaspoon vanilla. Scald milk over hot water. Let crumbs stand in hot milk over hot water, adding half the sugar, and enough milk taken from bread and milk mixture to make thin enough to pour easily. Add to bread and milk mixture with remaining sugar, salt, vanilla and eggs slightly beaten. Turn into a buttered pudding dish and bake 30 minutes in a moderately slow oven. Serve warm with hard sauce.
