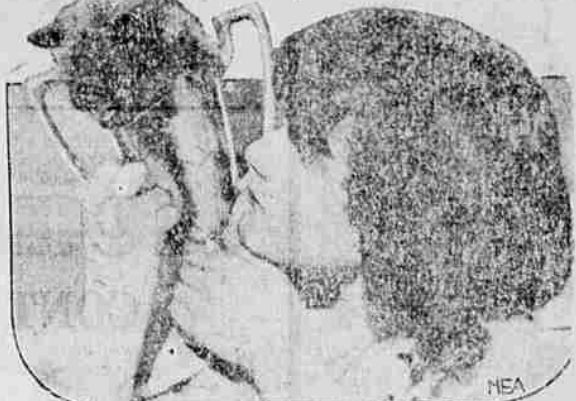
The Women of Mooseheart Legion will meet at the Moose hall Friday evening when installation of officers will be held. All members are requested to be present.
