Must Serve Sentence
PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 3 (AP)—A. E. Downing, sentenced to 12 months in McNeil Island and fined \$500 for an alleged mail fraud which involved mining property in Arizona and New Mexico, was ordered to surrender to the United States marshal today to start serving his sentence.

A last minute appeal was made and Judge McNary by telephone granted Downing's attorneys until Monday in which to hear the appeal. E. R. Anderson, jointly convicted and sentenced to six months in the county jail and a fine of \$500 was ordered to surrender today before the marshal's office closed.

FAVOR FARM CONFERENCE
WASHINGTON, Jan. 3 (AP)—Conferees between the senate agriculture committee and the farm board with a view to determining the board's permanent policy were advocated today by Senator Watson, of Indiana, the republican leader, upon his return from Indiana.
