Butter Hits The Downward Trail

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 3 (AP) —Following yesterday's decline in eggs, butter and butterfat prices hit the downward trail at the Portland produce exchange today. Butter was down 10 on all grades, while butterfat quotations tumbled 2c. This makes butter extra 36c and butterfat delivered at Portland 37c. Advances were announced in the prices of veal and pork by a leading produce company. Veal went up to 18 and 19c, and pork moved up to 15 and 15 1/2c.

Wheat Irregular In Chicago Today

CHICAGO, Jan. 3 (AP) —Sharp downturns in wheat quotations at Liverpool acted as a weight early today on the wheat market here. Dealers that there has been any export selling of Russian wheat were without any apparent influence on prices. Opening 1/4 to 1/2 off. Chicago wheat later declined a little more, and then rallied somewhat. Corn and oats were also easier, with corn starting 1/4 to 1/2 down, and subsequently holding near to the initial range. Provisions advanced.

Wheat closed irregular, ranging from 1/4 net decline to an equal advance. Closed 7/8 to 1/2 down, oats unchanged to 1/4 off and provisions varying from 2 @ 5c netback to a rise of 5c.

Close Steady In Exchange Trade

NEW YORK, Jan. 3 (AP) —Stock prices continued to fluctuate within a rather narrow trading area today with neither the "bull" nor "bear" operators apparently able to gain any decided advantage. The market appeared to lack leadership. Operators for the rise finding it difficult to attract an outside following which speculators for the decline hesitated about selling a dull market. Call money dropped from 6 to 5 per cent. Special issues surged upwards in a brisk fashion in the final hour. Hudson Motors, Pullman, General Railway Signal, J. I. Case, and Otis Elevator improved 3 to 5 points. Fox Film "A" rebounded to 22 1/2. As the shorts were driven to cover and U. S. Steel crossed 169 again. The close was steady.

Artificial "Sun" for Horses Thoroughbreds in a racing stable near Chicago receive ultraviolet-ray treatments every day, as it is believed that they need artificial sunlight when the natural supply is unavailable, as much as do human beings, says Popular Mechanics Magazine. A short exposure to the special lamp is said to give an effect equivalent to that from a whole day in the sun. The treatment is of special benefit in winter, when the animals are confined indoors.

Starlings Made Trouble Unexpectedly falling dead, two farm horses near Dijon, France, played a part in an unusual case of electrocution.
