NATIONAL GUARD TO BE INCREASED

Will be Brought to a Strength of 90,000 During This Fiscal Year.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7 (AP)—An improved and more tactically efficient national guard will be brought to a strength of 90,000 during the remainder of the current fiscal year.

Plans for addition headquarters and units were given the house war department appropriations subcommittee by Major General William G. Everson, chief of the militia bureau.

Increase in strength authorized for the fiscal year 1929 and 1930, together with a number of conversions, he said, "have improved the organization and tactical efficiency of the infantry divisions and harbor defense troops."

"It should be noted," General Everson pointed out, "that the two increments of 1929 and 1930 have not materially increased expenditures and it is hoped that another increment may be authorized in 1931."

The position of the secretary of war that though it was "highly desirable" to make an increment for 1931, it would have to be omitted due to other increases in the department budget, was outlined to the committee.

The national guard program for reaching a strength of 210,000 in 1932, it was pointed out, would not be endangered through omission of the 1931 outlay.

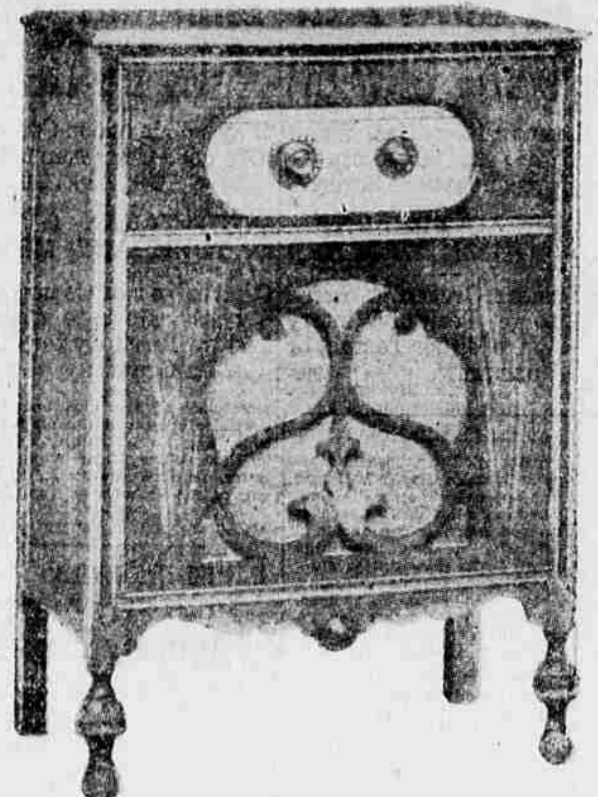

HIGHER BASKETS EXPECTED SOON

Rings to be 11 or 12 Feet Above Maple Court, Expert Predicts.

Perhaps the next bit of important extirpation for the rules surgeons of basketball will be the elimination, or modification of the center jump or tip-off play.

The national basketball coaches association has made definite recommendations to the joint basketball rules committee regarding this important feature.

Already high school, college and university teams have tried out the center play changes in regular games and reports coming in indicate their enthusiasm for a change from the old rule. However, ball rangers and versatile basketball players will always be at a premium.

Experts predict that within one or two years baskets will be raised to a height of 11 or 12 feet instead of 10 feet—the present height.

The coaches agreed that new plans should be tried in practice and match games during the coming season and that reports be submitted to the committee. It suggested two major plans as a basis for trial.

Suggestion No. 1
1. Eliminate the center jump.
2. Toss a coin for possession of ball out of bounds.
3. The winner is given ball on defensive end line, out of bounds, within plus feet of basket on either side.
4. Play then begins within five seconds as in the present rule on out of bounds ball.
5. On all field or foul goal baskets the official secures ball and

Suggestion No. 2
1. Draw two circles on either side of the present center circle.
2. The player who is to put the ball in play stands in the circle which is farthest from his basket, with his own team behind him.
3. The other team must remain behind the other circle until referee calls "play."
4. The player in the circle must put the ball in play by passing to a team mate promptly after the referee gives the signal to start play.

Still another suggestion retains the jump at center, but zones the other four men away from center. This last suggestion comes from men who have had much experience with the professional game of basketball. Blocking is emphasized in the professional game.

SNOW DAMAGE IS HEAVY IN WEST OREGON

Klamath county, an automobile was able to reach the Lake of the Woods, reached at the foot of Mt. McLoughlin in January when Mr. and Mrs. Leslie Rogers, residents here, made the 45-mile trip through a snowstorm Sunday in two and one-half hours.

A light car jumped the curb at Klamath Falls and dropped over a six foot bank after skidding on a hill. The machine landed right side up on four wheels undamaged.

The coldest weather of the winter hit the Rogue river, according to Mefford reports, and the mercury slipped down to 15 degrees above after two days of intermittent snow.

WESTERN STATES COLD
SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 7 (AP)—Freezing temperatures in the far west followed today in the wake of the general storm which swept down out of the north in a fury of rain, hail and snow yesterday to give even California a taste of real winter weather.

That the storm would pass to the west, except in southern California, was the prediction of the weather bureau here which forecast abnormally low temperatures for the region west of the Mississippi river. Snow in Nevada and the Sierra with fair weather in the remainder of the far western states was predicted.

16 Below in Montana
At midnight a general drop in temperatures was reported beginning in eastern Washington, northern Idaho and western Montana and extending through Oregon into southern California.

In Helena, Mont., the temperature dropped 14 degrees to 16 below zero in 48 hours. Snow was reported heavy in Yellowstone park where the mercury hovered between zero and four degrees above.

The lowest temperature in Washington was registered at Republic where it was 4 1/2 degrees below zero. Spokane shivered under a fresh wind laden with dust-like snow.

Seattle was colder than Nome, Alaska, where four degrees above freezing temperature prevailed. Minimum temperature in Seattle was 25 and maximum of 29 degrees.

Extreme cold and snow in places where it is seldom seen were features of the storm in California. Hounding in Blackfoot county, reported the heaviest snowfall in five years. Kennett had five inches, Yuba and Wood two inches. The Shiloh divide reported 18 inches with more falling steadily. Highways in that region were kept clear with snowplows.

Fleet and snow, accompanied by a high wind but telephone and telegraph wires out of commission in Northern California. Bureka was isolated from outside communication lines when a tree fell across wires between South Park and Fox Mountain. Repairs were being rushed and communication was expected to be reestablished today.

Snow in California
In the Truckee region snow was from 18 to 40 inches deep. Yosemite had five inches of snow with more falling.

Further south, Mt. Tamalpais, Mt. Diablo, Old Baldy in the San Bernardino range and other highlands were white-capped.

Where it was not snowing, the storm drenched the foot of the state. San Francisco underwent a heavy rain storm.
