

LEGION POST ESTABLISHES LOAN FUND

(Continued from Page One) a quorum. Said board shall be selected as follows: "A nucleus shall be formed by the appointment, by the post commander, of four men to serve for a period of one year. He shall then appoint four men to serve for a two-year period. The eight thus appointed shall then select four members to serve one year. Each subsequent year the new commander shall appoint four members to serve for a two-year period, and those four in conjunction with the four held over from the previous year shall select the other four members. Any vacancies occurring shall be filled by the board. All appointments shall be ratified by the commander. A chairman and secretary shall be elected by the board, at the first meeting after the appointment of the new board. The board shall be required to report its activities to the post upon stipulated occasions, except

that it shall not be the policy of the board to report to the general public, the names of the recipients of the loans.

"This board shall be known as 'The American Legion Student Loan Board' and shall be the final court of appeals in all matters pertaining to the loan fund. All testimony of character, ability to repay, academic record, and recommendations furnished as required data for the securing of a loan by eligible students shall be passed upon by the board, which shall in turn keep and file all such records of loans and transactions of all kind pertaining thereto."

Following the regular meeting, the legionnaires joined the Legion auxiliary in a basket social and dance.
