Egg And Butter Market Remains Weak In Oregon

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 10 (AP)—The egg and butter market undertone continues weak, but no further reductions in prices were reported today by the Portland produce exchange and the Pacific Co-operative Producers, by whom the quotations on these respective products are authorized. A leading produce company reports a surplus of cranberry supplies, and the price has been reduced to 12c a pound wholesale. California spinach is on the market at \$4 for a 40 pound crate.

Lettuce is offered at \$2.50 to \$3.25. Potatoes are higher at \$2.25 to \$3.50. Mexican tomatoes are \$5 a box. Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the United States department of Agriculture says: "Potato markets strengthened at practically all winter shipping districts throughout the United States. Landings have been liberal at Yakima valley points all week, and buying by Portland and Seattle shippers there has been active. Although virtually no price changes were made at Yakima, prices at many of the larger shipping districts were slightly higher. "There are practically no surplus fruit and vegetable stocks on Portland's wholesale market now. Storage stocks are rapidly diminishing and some commodities, such as apples, are temporarily unavailable, until California shipments arrive on the market. "Lettuce is weaker at southern shipping points, and top prices were a shade lower here today. Tomato movement is very slow, \$5 per bag of re-packed Imperial valley stock. Stock Prices In Recovery Today

NEW YORK, Jan. 10 (AP)—Stock prices made further recovery at the opening of today's market, with buying stimulated by the decrease of \$72,000,000 in federal reserve brokers' loan. Allied Chemical advanced 3 1/2 points, General Electric 2 1/2, Otis Elevator 2, Columbian Carbon 1 1/2, and initial gains of a point or so were registered by Coty, J. I. Case, American Telephone and Bothlehem Steel. U. S. Steel opened with a block of 5,000 shares at 17 1/2 up to 1 1/4.

Wheat Unsettled And Lower Today

CHICAGO, Jan. 10 (AP)—Flattening out of export business in North American wheat did much to send wheat prices here down today to the lowest level touched this week. Besides, much notice was taken of statements attributed to Samuel H. McKelvie, member of the federal farm board, that he had been informed spring wheat growers northwest expected to increase seeded acreage this year. Reports that Russia had sold more than 1,000,000 bushels of rye to Norway counted also as a depressing influence on wheat values. Wheat closed unsettled, 1 1/2c to 3 1/2c a bushel lower than yesterday's finish. Corn closed 1c to 1 1/2c down, oats 3/4c to 1/2c off, and provisions varying from 20c decline to a rise of 12c.

WOOL REPORT

BOSTON, Jan. 10 (AP)—The Commercial bulletin tomorrow will say: "The demand for wool has been spotty and medium wools, influenced by the foreign markets, are quotably lower this week, although fine wools have changed hardly at all. "The manufacturing position, while evidently sound, is in between seasons and not yet developed in any definite direction. "The foreign market is opening for the post-holiday sales with prices rather in favor of the buyer, although not to the extent some thought probable. The wool growers in the primary markets are inclined to withhold wool from sale rather than accept current bids. "The trade is watching with interest the developments in the farm cooperative selling scheme. "Mohair is dull and nominal here with prices favoring the buyer abroad.
