Wesley Williams, county's leading grower, who is the owner of the copyright label has contracted with the General Fruit corporation, the largest distributing agency on the Pacific coast, to handle Umpqua valley melons exclusively as long as the local supply will meet the demand. The company has estimated that it can handle melons from 400 acres and growers are arranging to limit their commercial production to that acreage.
