## MENUS

**By Sister Mary**  
These are the days when hearty luncheon dishes with a peppery taste are most relished. The platter of thinly sliced cold meat, cool salad and wafer-like bread and butter that is so quickly and easily prepared for the hot weather luncheon is not for those nippy winter days.

No busy housekeeper likes to spend much time over the preparation of the noon meal if a dinner must be served for the evening meal. But at least one hot nourishing dish must be supplied for luncheon.

Tomato soup—left over from a previous meal or canned and freshly opened—is a decided help in the quick preparation of appetizing luncheon dishes. One cup of tomato soup goes far toward adding zest to many a concoction and often uses to advantage this delectable bit that might otherwise go unused.

School children will derive much nourishment from the cheese and tomato combinations and the cook will spend but a short time in the preparation. The use of the soup makes it unnecessary to go through the process of straining and the seasoning of the soup adds piquancy to the whole dish. If milk is used in the making, soda is not needed with soup to prevent curdling as in the case of canned strained tomatoes.
