### 10 Carloads Of Stock Shipped From Wallowa

WALLOWA (Special)—Ten carloads of stock were shipped out of

Wallowa county Saturday. The Wallowa Shippers association had four carloads, three of which were double decks of hogs and one mixed load of cattle and hogs. The other six car loads were cattle out of Enterprise and Joseph. Recently Joe McFarlan, well known sheep man of Wallowa county, who with his family resides at his ranch on Snake river during the winter, had the mis-

fortune of cutting his thumb badly with an axe, severing the bone just below the joint. On account of the low water in Snake river he was unable to go to Lewiston so he had to come to Wallowa which is much farther and a more difficult journey. The distance of 50 miles from his ranch to Innaha was made half way on horseback and the balance by auto and from there to Enterprise, owing to the drifted condition of the road, by team, where he met the stage and came on to Wallowa hospital. There is some hope that the thumb may be saved. As there are no means of communication with the ranch his wife and children anxiously await his return.

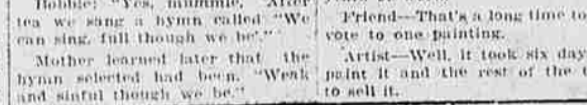
