## GRAIN MARKETS GENERALLY WEAK

### Cash Grains Relatively Firmer Than Futures, Government Reports.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.—Grain markets generally were weak and lower during the week ending January 18, but cash prices were relatively firmer than futures, reflecting the limited offerings and fairly active domestic demand, according to the Weekly Grain Market Review of the United States Bureau of agricultural economics. Light export inquiry for North American wheat because of continued competition from the southern hemisphere in the European markets was virtually responsible for the decline in wheat. It was independently weak because of the very slow domestic demand and almost entire absence of export inquiry. Feed grains were weak under a slow demand, influenced somewhat by the unfavorable market situation for dairy products. Flax declined sharply notwithstanding the small domestic offerings. Argentine flax prices declined about 3c per bushel, largely as a result of the slow European demand for seed and was a weakening factor in the domestic market.

### No Changes Today In Butter Prices

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 20 (AP)—After its advance of 7c last week, butter prices began the week without change, but firm in undertone. Whether the present price remains depends upon what action is taken at the afternoon session of the Portland produce exchange today.

Egg prices were strong but unchanged.

The fruit and vegetable situation is still showing the effects of the weather with products scarce and prices comparatively high.

The new army regulations, which were issued to all posts last October, charges the commanding officer of each military station with enforcement of the prohibition laws within his jurisdiction. It also extends army discipline, Mr. Hurley said, to any officer convicted by civil authorities of prohibition law violations off government reservation.

The new regulation was issued, Mr. Hurley said, as the army's contribution to the administration of prohibition. Its scope extends to army posts in the Philippines and wherever they may be outside the continental United States even though there be no prohibition law in that country. It was pointed out, however, that the older army regulations made all these posts dry.
