Dr. Packard To Give Campaign In Church Here

Noted Evangelist and Radio Pastor Coming to Christian Congregation in May.

Dr. Paul Henry Packard, one of America's foremost evangelists and noted radio pastor, has been called to La Grande for an evangelistic campaign in May. The Central Church of Christ extended him a unanimous call on Sunday morning to lead them in a pre-Pentecost meeting. Dr. Packard is pastor-evangelist, Wichita Falls, Texas. The great church of which he is pastor grants him several months each year for general evangelism for which he is eminently fitted. Evangelist Packard has won 50,000 for Christ in his meetings and located pastors. He is a most successful radio preacher, having recently conducted a series of evangelistic meetings by radio with excellent results and souls converted.
