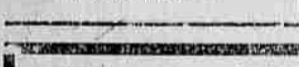

The 1930 schedule for Oregon State, starting with two big California games with Stanford and U.S.C., and including two Shrine benefit games in Portland and Chicago, is the toughest Schisler has had since he came to the campus in 1924.

Schisler recently returned from the east where he completed final arrangements for a West Virginia game on Soldier field, Chicago. This game, a Shrine benefit, will be played to a capacity audience, officials there told Coach Schisler.

Should the Staters win this game they will be matched again 1930 years later with the 1931 winner. It was agreed.

The other benefit game on the Crangemen's schedule is with Washington State college in Portland earlier in the season. To meet this heavy schedule successfully, Schisler must find replacements for four dependable linemen and five backfield regulars who finished their college football career last fall.

**INDEPENDENTS TO
PLAY SATURDAY**

Comets, Outcasts to Stage Court Battle at L. D. S. Recreational Hall.

During recent years La Grande basketball fans have witnessed some very good independent basketball, probably reaching a zenith in the First Ward M. L. A. team here a couple of seasons ago that had unquestioned championship of Eastern Oregon, plus a legitimate claim to the state independent championship, which claim was shared by the Eugene Mohawks.

The claim was established by an unblemished record in Eastern Oregon, plus a decisive win over the Portland L. D. S. five. Although efforts were made, it was impossible to schedule a deciding game with the Mohawks.

That team was led by Mose Lyman, now center of Oregon State college, and other players included Golden Geertsen, former school player; Frank Black, high school star; Eldon Banks, W. Stoddard, M. Stoddard and Berry, all players of note. That same year they suffered their only defeat from the championship Willamette university, 56 to 25, with Lyman scoring 14 of the losing points, and Geertsen second with 6. Adams, with 14, Glass with 12, and Lefebvre with 10, proved the undoing of the locals. That was big Cavendish's first year on the Willamette varsity, followed by his selection as all-northwest center. Hank also played with Spec Kene's team.

Another Crack Team

Another crack team here a few years ago included such players, most of them with college experience, as McTavish, Garly, Thielson, George Macdonald, etc. They won the Eastern Oregon independent title but a short schedule prevented them from covering enough territory to lay claim to a share in state honors.

Of recent years, either La Grande or Helix has had the championship, and two teams have been organized here this season to help uphold the local honor. The two meet here Saturday evening at 8:30 o'clock in the L. D. S. Recreational hall, and an exhibition of high class basketball is expected. The Comets, including the three Barker boys, G. Moore, Bud Beard, M. Stoddard and Elmo Stevenson, E. O. N. instructor, are expected to make a serious bid for the title, and are planning on scheduling games with Helix. Moore is a center of about the same ability as Lyman, and the others on the team are speedy, sure point makers. With a good deal of defensive strength.

Outcasts Strong

The Outcasts, so named because they are ineligible to play high school basketball because of the 20-year and the previous senior citizen records last December by the Oregon State High School Athletic association, also have a strong outfit with the Newlin twins, Berry, Thompson, Patten and Walte on the lineup. They recently defeated the E. O. N. seconds 31 to 15 in their first game.

Present indications are that a fair-sized crowd will attend the game.

**\$10,000,000 Frauds
Bring Sentences**

LONDON, Jan. 14 (AP)—Charles Hatry, for many years head of the widespread Hatry interests, was sentenced to 14 years penal servitude at the old Bailey court today and an additional five years on charges of defrauding.

Hatry also was sentenced to two years on a charge of conspiracy, all sentences to run concurrently.

Edward Daniels was sentenced to seven years penal servitude and five years to run concurrently and also two years on another count and a further five years on a second indictment, all to run concurrently.

Albert E. Tabor was sentenced to two periods of three years to run concurrently and also a further two years at hard labor also to run concurrently.

John Graham Dixon received five years of penal servitude and two years at hard labor as well as a further period of five years penal servitude all to run concurrently.

The four men were on trial for alleged financial frauds involving nearly 2,000,000 (about \$10,000,000).

**Nearly Billion
Dollars Spent
In '29 On Radio**

Nearly a billion dollars was spent on radio in 1929.

This huge sum was piled up by the public in its demand for air entertainment devices despite any reverses the year may have experienced that would have tended to reduce sales at the approach of the Christmas season.

The exact figures, says Radio Retailing in its annual survey of the industry, were \$805,000,000, divided \$437,500,000 for receivers; \$177,500,000 for tubes and \$111,000,000 for accessories. In 1928 the total was \$530,550,000, of which \$320,000,000 was spent for sets.

A summary of the survey refers to 1929 as the best year radio has yet experienced. In 1922 sales of tubes and receivers totaled only \$11,000,000.

Of the facts gleaned from the survey is the statement that since AC tubes came into existence 7,100,000 socket powered receivers have been sold for use in the 13,700,000 homes wired for electricity. Thus 12,300,000 electrically equipped houses are without AC sets.

The survey also points out that "a study of buying trends verifies the theory that the separate unit speaker and separate unit cabinet are bowing before the march of the self-contained console."
