**100 YEARS IN ROCK CELL**  
NORMAN, Okla. (AP)—The theory that frogs can live 100 years or more while encased in rock is advanced by Dr. Charles E. Decker, University of Oklahoma paleontologist.  
Experiments with hibernated frogs found in Oklahoma have disclosed him that they were from one to 75 years old, but he sees no reason why they should not live much longer.  
Derivatives of calcium in the earth, Dr. Decker explains, solidify about a frog's body after it has dug down to moisture in seeking hibernation.  
In their rock-bound cell the frogs become blind, he has found, with their bodies turning semi-transparent in time.
