## GRAIN MARKETS ARE UNSETTLED

### Wheat Continues Weak, Government Report for Last Week Shows.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27 (AP)—Grain markets were generally unsettled during the week ending January 25. Wheat continued weak with native and Argentine wheat still supplying the bulk of the European requirements, according to the Weekly Grain Market Review of the United States bureau of agricultural economics. Corn prices turned slightly downward, influenced by prospects of increased receipts, but oats and barley held steady under a fair feeder demand for the reduced offerings. Rice was weak with wheat, but the rice market steadied slightly as a result of some advance in the Argentine market.

## Market Recovery Continues Today

NEW YORK, Jan. 27 (AP)—Recovery in the stock market which started last week and lifted the general level of prices out of the narrow trading area within which they had been fluctuating since before Christmas, was resumed after an early period of irregularity today. New leaders, particularly in the steel, copper and food groups were brought forward by operators for the advance when heavy profit-taking retarded the rise in some of the recent favorites.

## Fresh Medium Eggs Decline One Cent

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 27 (AP)—The price of fresh medium eggs was reduced one cent to 25c today. Other grades were unchanged.  
Butter prices were firm and stationary.  
All sorts of poultry and all kinds of fresh meat, except pork, has advanced, according to quotations by the Portland Product company. The advances range from 1c to 2c. Scarcity and a better demand brought about the advances.
