Ruth Byers has been absent from school for several days due to an attack of the flu. She is in the sixth grade at Central.

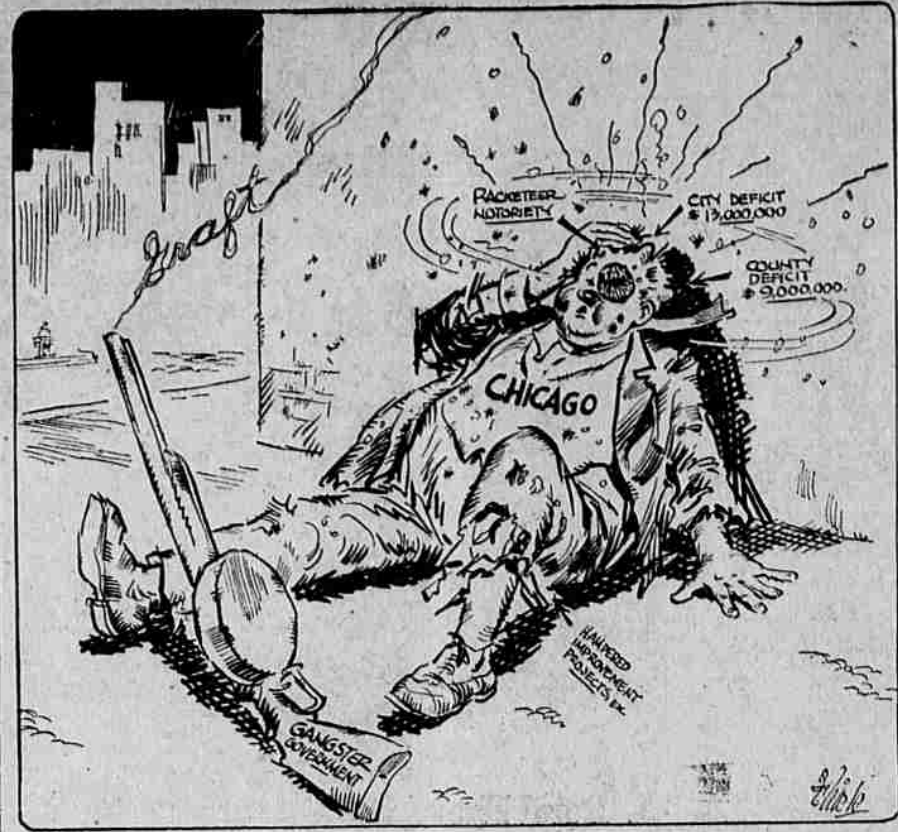

LAFOLLETTE MUST PAY
SALEM, Ore., Jan. 28 (AP)—Charles H. Lafollette, former member of the legislature from Washington county, must comply with the terms of a circuit court decree by Judge Walter H. Evans of Multnomah county or he must go to jail.

The decree grew out of a divorce suit in which Mrs. Mary Lafollette was the plaintiff. The circuit court order required Lafollette to pay into the court \$75 a month for the maintenance of his wife and their four children, and also to pay \$75 for court costs and \$50 attorney fees. He failed to comply with the order. After some legal sparring he was held to be in contempt of court and sentenced to serve six months in jail. There was a provision in the judgment, however, that he should be relieved of the imprisonment at any time upon payment of the money provided for in the order. It was from this order that he appealed.
