French President Does Daily Dozen By Dawn's Light

PARIS (AP)—While the milkman rattles his cans before dawn at the back door of the French white house, Gaston Doumergue, president of France, trots up and down a long, airy hall to his pajamas.

The president, according to reports that drift down the back stairs, takes his daily dozen shortly after 5 o'clock in the morning. Those who have seen him at it, assert that he usually wears a blue and white striped costume and that he does an excellent job of exercising.

The president is approaching his 67th birthday, but he shows no signs of old age. He is still famous for the stunts that took him from the chamber of deputies to a seven-year term in the Elysee palace. His "time" will be up a year from next June.

Besides the running exercise, the president does bending and walks on his toes, stiff-legged. Then he gets down on all fours and paddles around, making a good quarter hour of hard physical work to start the day.

The walking and running were prescribed for the chief of state because much of his duty is attending at ceremonies, inspecting institutions and receiving delegations, all requiring him to be on his feet, smiling and alert, sometimes for hours at a time.

Chicago Ready To Start Work For 1933 Fair

By Walter T. Brown (CHICAGO AP)—The snows of winter scarcely will have melted before giant steam shovels will be fashioning the "Century of Progress" world's fair of 1933.

Ten million dollars on call, guaranteed by 100 individuals and firms, assured the city that it again will attempt what is so successfully accomplished in 1893—entertain the world.

One hundred years will have passed since Chicago was a village of 28 voters with an area of three-eighths of a mile. The Windy City intends telling about its 100-year progress—telling, also, the progress of all nations.

Two buildings, the administration and the travel and transportation, virtually will be completed this year. They are to be built between thirty-first and thirty-ninth streets, and the exposition site, April 1.

Along the shore of Lake Michigan, and on two artificial islands the fair buildings, amusements and exhibits will be set. The entrance will be at Roosevelt road—a formal taxi fare from downtown.

Chicago Ready To Start Work For 1933 Fair

By day the exposition will be a dazzling city of white and pastel shades. At night its radiance will be flashed to the skies, and reflected in the submarine tinted lake waters.

All that science and art have developed, and engineering has applied, will be employed to make a fairy show place.

Joining the fair site are the Field Museum of Natural History, the Adler planetarium, the Shedd aquarium and the mammoth athletic stadium, Soldier field. All will be utilized for the exposition.

The pageant grounds will stretch 50 blocks. The north end of the fair will include two artificial islands, one now completed, upon which stands the Shedd aquarium.

A system of canals will enable visitors to travel past, and through buildings in wireless electric gondolas.

On the ground, on terraces and on roofs of buildings will be moving sidewalks. In order to lower congestion at entrances, visitors will enter the buildings on the roofs and leave at the ground level.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Jan. 28 (AP)—The Vancouver Lions still lead their closest rivals in the Pacific coast hockey league race, the Portland Buckaroos, by three points.

The two teams battled through seventy minutes of fast and ruckered hockey to a one goal draw at the arena here last night. Five thousand fans witnessed the game.

Enters Race In Near East Trade

BEIRUT, Syria (AP)—The improvement of the Beirut harbor is the answer of France to England, Persia, and Iraq and of the developments in harbor and railroad facilities throughout the countries that depend upon the Eastern Mediterranean for an outlet to Europe.

The French government has granted a loan of \$6,000,000 to the Beirut Harbor company to carry on extension work. The harbor at present is so small that no large ships can anchor.

The extension, which it is expected will be completed in five years, provides for the lengthening the existing jetty and converting Mornay bay into a protected harbor. Four quays will be constructed to allow the largest liners to dock.

England plans through the development of the Haifa harbor and the laying of the Haifa-Baghdad railroad, to have an accessible gateway to Central Asia. France plans to use the new harbor in her mandated territory for the same purpose.

It is generally believed that construction of Beirut harbor may bring to fruition the long-delayed project of the Tripoli-Batroun-Haifa rail line, which in turn would mean the completion of the Cairo-Canton-Haifa line, linking three continents by one railway track.

Portland Signs Carl Mays, Hurler

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 28 (AP)—Tom Turner, president of the Portland baseball club, expressed satisfaction yesterday with the signing of Carl Mays, famous major-league pitcher, to be on the job of the Portland Beavers.

Mays is a former New York Giant, former Yankee, former Cincinnati Red and former Boston Red Sox player. He signed on the dotted line with Portland after negotiations started between him and Turner in San Francisco.

HISTORIAN PUNCTURES ANOTHER HEROIC MYTH
GREENOCK, Scotland (AP)—Robert the Bruce and his persevering spider are the latest victims of the process of historical fact research.

He also said that in the winter of 1306-7, when the Bruce was supposed to be lying half-starved in a cave learning his message of courage from the spider, the Scottish hero was in fact in the rudd, but by no means uncomfortable, surrounded by the Norwegian Court.

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Cantillon Fights Battle With Death
CHICKMAN, Ky., Jan. 28 (AP)—"Tongo Joe" Cantillon, baseball veteran, carried on his battle with death this morning, hours past the time doctors predicted it would be possible for him to remain alive.

Will power alone kept the veteran alive, doctors said, as scores of messages came from notables in the sport world.

His only rational moment since his condition took a turn for the worse Sunday brought back memories of his old days and he struggled to tell a yarn about Babe Waddell, pitching ace who he is credited with discovering, before he turned once more into coma.

Attendants this morning said Cantillon had passed a very bad night and gradually is getting weaker.
