she set a price of \$450,000 on the home and it could not be sold. He said he paid Mrs. Taylor \$100 a month for a long time, and increased her allowance to \$135 a month when she moved to Hollywood with him several years ago.

Mrs. Taylor not only maintained herself and daughter on that allowance, Hutchinson said, but saved enough to build an apartment house out of it.

"My wife was selfish and arrogant," Hutchinson said. "She continually harassed me with financial burdens. My home in Chicago cost me so much that I couldn't bear it—I wanted to get away. Mrs. Taylor on the other hand was thrifty, kindly, considerate, never pursued me, called me on the telephone, or asked me to go places with her. She was always modest—always tried to save money, and that kind of conduct appealed to me."

Mrs. Hutchinson, a society leader in Chicago, previously testified she did not suspect her husband was unfaithful to her until 1927, and declared she still loved him. Mrs. Taylor, the first witness, freely admitted her relationship with Hutchinson, but said she did not know he was married until long after Jane was born. She said Hutchinson told her he was not a marrying man when she asked that he marry her.

"When she first learned of it she threatened to leave me."
