George Ward and Mosej Sunn who are employed near Baker came in for a short visit with their families. They returned to Baker Sunday.

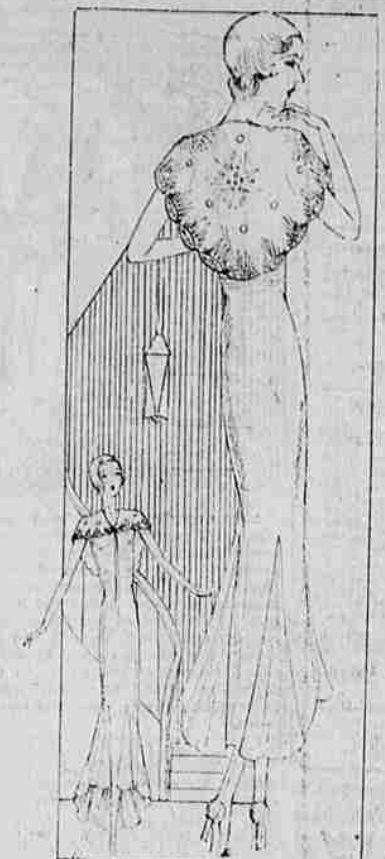

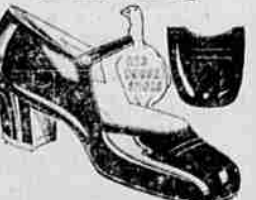
