Heavy Selling Plunges Wheat To New Levels

CHICAGO, Feb. 3 (AP)—Heavy selling to stop losses of holders of wheat future delivery contracts here plunged the wheat market down today to new levels. Most traders appeared to regard as bearish the farm boards' efforts to stabilize values, and the market was without any important speculative buying support. A further disturbing factor was notable dearth of export demand for wheat from North America, whereas Russia sold 185,000 bushels of wheat from Great Britain, and was offering more.

Notwithstanding 3,274,000 bushels decrease of the United States wheat supply total today, wheat offered a maximum drop of nearly 5 cents a bushel, and closed unsettled 3 3/4 to 4 1/2 3/4 cents under Saturday's finish. Corn closed 1 1/2 to 1 3/4, oats 3 1/2 to 3 3/4, and provisions showing 10c to 20c gain.

Stocks Drop Due To Cereals Slump

NEW YORK, Feb. 3 (AP)—Stocks were heavily sold in the late trading today following news of a sharp drop in wheat, corn and cotton prices. Many of the early advances of 3 to 6 points were erased and numerous shares were driven from 3 to 8 points under the Saturday's close. Farm implement and merchandise issues were among those freshly sold.

EMPLOYMENT IN MILLS IS NEAR NORMAL

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 3 (Special)—After being at a standstill for nearly three weeks because of snow and the unusually cold weather, employment in the lumber industry of the Pacific northwest is gradually returning to normal according to the 41 employment service letter. Hundreds of men are receiving work every day after the enforced shutdown of lumber manufacturing plants. The letter says: "Although but few logging camps have been able to resume work this week, sawmills on the west coast are gradually getting under way after one of the tightest shutdowns in recent years. Many sawmills still are shut-time, while others are at work because of snow or ice shortages. Latest reports from the inland Empire district indicate that many mills there, while operating, are doing so under great difficulty, due to log ponds freezing."
