Altogether, I do not expect too great results from the United States of Europe efforts in the immediate future, and would, therefore, be extremely happy to see the organization of the league of nations further strengthened.

I sincerely hope that the cooperation between the European nations will grow. It is a real necessity. On the other hand, I am not so great an optimist that I am blinded to the many obstacles that must be overcome, before we can arrive at that United Europe about

which I have been requested to put forth my point of view.

PREMIER FAVORS EUROPEAN UNION

Theodore Stauning, Prime Minister of Denmark, Explains His Idea.

(Editor's Note: Theodore Stauning, prime minister of Denmark, who has contributed this article for The Associated Press, worked his way up from a cigar maker's bench. He was born in humble circumstances and has earned his own bread since he was 13 years old. His first political office came 20 years later when he was elected to the Folketing. He soon became leader of the Danish labor party and in 1924 formed the first labor government

in Denmark. His present official regime dates from April, 1929.)

COPENHAGEN (AP)—To this European generation, the idea of all United Europe is by no means distant. The chaotic state in which the Great War left Europe calls for sober thought and many of us now look with admiration to the United States of America as an example for Europe to follow.

Over there one finds a systematized cooperation between a number of states. These states do not fight each other by customs restrictions or by armed forces, and, on the whole, the conditions of life in these American states are of such a nature that they might well be wished for in this Europe of ours.

Many Obstacles
What has been possible for the

United States of America, so young in their present form, is, however, not just so easy to carry through in the ancient states of Europe. When the possibilities of a United Europe are being discussed, I always make me think of the enormous difficulties to be surmounted.

There are at least 20 different languages in Europe and just as many, or perhaps more, monetary systems. There are old, independent money-institutions in all countries, and there are a number of industrial concerns, which up till now have competed with each other.

Customs walls hamper commercial intercourse between the various states, and these restrictions are not merely of a protectionist nature. Often they form important factors in the economic life of the various states.

The state of culture and the political and economic interests of

the states are conflicting. There are larger states and smaller states, and the economic life of the latter are threatened by that of the former.

There are perhaps a hundred or more problems to be solved, private or national interests to be safeguarded, when some day this question is to be tackled.

These problems must be added the safeguarding of the new world-organization, which was the result of the Versailles treaty. The league of nations comprises inter-European as well as extra-European nations, and I consider it to be of the utmost importance for Europe that peaceful cooperation is secured between the European nations and those of the other parts of the world.

In my speech at the session of the league, in September 1929, I expressed the opinion that the league of nations ought to show the greatest interest in the United

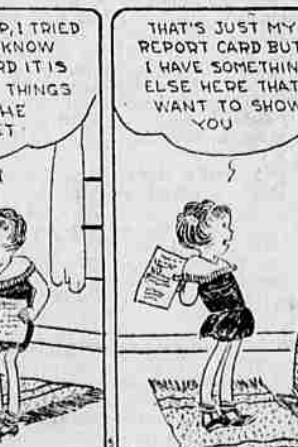
