Wheat Heavy At Closing; Prices Below Tuesday

CHICAGO, Feb. 5 (AP)—Reacting late today from early advances in price, the wheat market here went decidedly below yesterday's finish. Further disposal of Russian wheat to Great Britain was reported, with word also that 10,000 tons of wheat from Russia had arrived at Baltimore, Germany...

Wheat closed heavy, at the day's bottom level 5/8 to 3/4 a bushel under yesterday's latest figures. Corn closed 3/8 to 1/2 a cent, oats unchanged to 1/8 to 1/4 off, and provisions varying from 7c decline to a rise of 10c.

Egg And Butter Quotations Are Steadier Today

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 5 (AP)—Egg and butter quotations were steadier today than they have been for some time. Demand has shown much improvement. All country meats and chicken proving conditions reduced January. Cabbage, spinach, beets, and turnips of No. 1 quality are unavailable. Prices of these items are generally lower, due to quality. Cauliflower supplies are liberal, and No. 1 stock has declined to \$1.25-\$1.40 per crate. Tugot Sound hothouse rhubarb arrivals continue to increase, and prices continue to decline.

Edward Slater Dead; Came To Union In 1890

By Mrs. L. Z. Terrall (Observer Correspondent) UNION (Special)—Edward Slater, who died at Hot Lake January 31, was born in Fermanagh county in Northern Ireland, March 9, 1855. He came to this country in 1877 and lived for some time in Illinois and Kansas before finally locating in Union in 1890. He never married and leaves one brother, Alex Slater, who is the sole survivor of a family of 12 children. He leaves several nephews and nieces and an adopted brother, Wm. Slater, of La Grande. Though not affiliated with any church he was of Old Methodist stock and lived an honest, independent life.

"Wall Street" Has Ralph Ince In Star Role Ralph Ince, who is co-starring in Alleen Pringle in "Wall Street," the Columbia all-talking drama of love and finance coming to the State theater on Thursday for a three-day run, has mastered many phases of the dramatic field. He is an actor, director and writer.

Although he comes of a long line of theatrical people and the stage was considered a sort of Ince family heirloom, Ralph was not particularly enthusiastic about being an actor in those early days.
