REDS PURCHASE LEO DUROCHER

Also Complete Deal With Brooklyn for McWeeny —Luque is Exchanged.

NEW YORK, Feb. 6 (AP)—The Cincinnati Reds have a new addition to their brilliant infield in Leo Durocher late of the New York Yankees.

The Reds acquired the flashy young shortstop yesterday for an unnamed player and an unnamed sum of money. It is expected that the Yankees will use the Cincinnati player to pay an obligation the club owes in the Pacific coast league.

But the question arises as to how it happened that the other American league clubs happened to waive on Durocher and just what use Cincinnati expects to make of him. Leo is a poor hitter, batting only .246 last season, but he is a brilliant fielder and an expert talker. To use him, Cincinnati probably will have to break up an already fine fielding combination of Ford and Fritz, who made a record of 194 double plays while playing shortstop and second base for the Reds in 1928.

Cincinnati completed another deal yesterday which brought Douglas McWeeny there from Brooklyn in exchange for Adolfo Luque. Neither of these right handed pitchers was particularly effective last season, but the managers of the two teams evidently believe they will be useful for the 1929 season. Luque, nearly 40 years old, is a crafty and resourceful pitcher. McWeeny, who has a world of speed, but has shown little control, has done his most effective pitching in Cincinnati.

ROUGH MATCH AT PORTLAND WON BY MYERS

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 6 (AP)—In a rough wrestling tilt here last night Bob Myers, Portland, one of the outstanding candidates in the country for the middleweight title of the world, defeated Kara Arshin Dashi, Turkish mauler, two out of three falls.

Myers won the first fall in 25 minutes with a wristlock. Dashi covered the count in 12 minutes with a crab or stonover hold. In trying for another crab hold after having Myers in a bay way from headlock, Dashi went down and when Myers used both feet in freeing himself and piled on the Turk for the final fall. The time was 15 minutes.

Harry Demerit, Chicago, scored an unopposed referee decision over Tarro Miyake, Japanese jiu jitsu expert, after both had won a fall in the preliminary.

European Skaters Make Clean Sweep

NEW YORK, Feb. 6 (AP)—Europe retains its supremacy over America in the art of figure skating.

Four European stars won the three titles in the world's figure skating championships at Madison Square Garden last night. Sonja Henie, pretty 17-year-old miss from Norway, easily won the women's championship for the fourth consecutive time and Karl Shaffer, university student from Vienna, took the men's crown with equal ease. The mixed doubles championship went to Mr. and Mrs. Pierre Brunet of France.

Shake-up In Team Lineup Is Likely

COVALLIS, Ore., Feb. 6 (AP)—A change in tactics and possible shifts in the lineup is in store for the Oregon State basketballers for the second game Friday with the University of Oregon, Coach Stutz Gill announced.

Gill is now rapidly getting back into shape after a recent illness and is taking hold of training with his old time vigor. The Staters are considered far below form in the first game last week and are determined to stage a comeback here.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Feb. 6 (AP)—Everett Marshall, former Washington State college wrestling champion, defeated Dr. Karl Sauer, Cleveland medic, here last night in straight falls. Marshall used the airplane spin in winning both falls, taking the first in 21 minutes 27 seconds and the second in 1 minute 45 seconds.

Holsten Leads Tossers; Buck Grayson Third

SEATTLE, Feb. 6 (AP)—A new scoring leader tops the northern division of the Pacific coast conference basketball race for the first time this season.

Claude Holsten, flashy Washington State college forward, has climbed from third place to pass Harold Stowell, eagle eye Idaho bigman, by three points while the latter was idle for a week. Holsten has 74 points to his credit and the Idaho man 71.

Stowell, however, has played in only six games compared with eight for the Cougar star, and will likely capture the leadership again this week when Idaho tangles with Washington at Moscow Friday and Saturday. Holsten will have a chance to come back Monday and Tuesday when Washington journeys to Pullman.

Grayson Drops to Third
Buck Grayson, southpaw guard of Oregon State college, held second place a week ago but he dropped to third when Holsten jumped to the top sending Stowell into second. Grayson has a total of 69 points. Hank Swanson, Washington forward, passed three basket tossers, to gain fourth place with 68. His team mate Stock McClary, center, trails Swanson by one point. Kenman is Oregon's leading scorer with 65.

TWO GROUPS OF WOMEN TO VISIT DEAD IN FRANCE

In air raids. Many died of disease contracted in their work. All of them saw the war at close range and served their country—well, only an ex-doughboy can tell you just how well these women served.

So next spring they are going back. Mrs. G. H. Taubles of San Francisco, national president of the Women's Overseas League, is now busy on plans. Posts in 52 cities are preparing to send delegations. Ceremonies for the graves are in preparation.

In the cemetery of Sureneze, where so many American soldiers are buried, are the graves of 25 American women. Five more are buried in Brookwood cemetery, in Surrey, England. Fifteen more are buried in Olse-Alsne-Seringsaat-Nesles. Another 15 lie in the Somme cemetery, at Bony Absne. An equal number lie at St. Mihiel, and there are six more in the Meuse Argonne.

And many, many more lie in single graves, scattered through battlefields and village cemeteries all over France.

Tales of Heroism

These nurses and canteen workers and ambulance drivers and the rest have their tales of heroism to tell—although, to be sure, they don't talk much about them.

They will tell you, for instance, that four of their number won the Distinguished Service Cross for bravery under fire, and 27 more got the Distinguished Service Medal. More than a dozen Y. M. C. A. women hold the Croix de Guerre, as do two Salvation Army women and 28 army nurses.

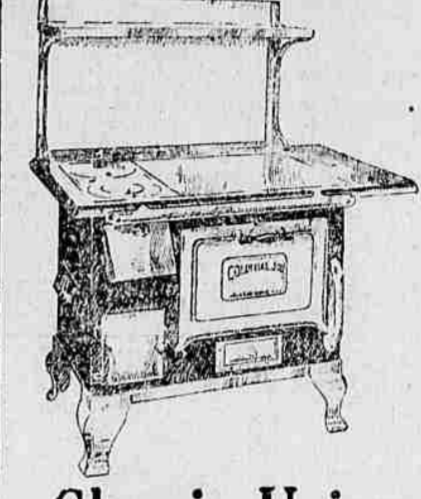

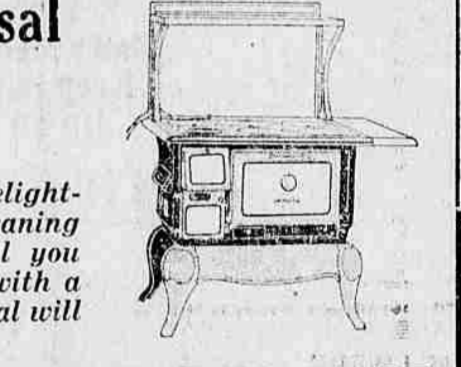

Although Flores carried a small picture of the virgin of Guadalupe in his pocket they did not believe his crime had a religious motive, but laid it rather to a plot of "Vasconcelistas" as adherents of the defeated presidential candidate Jose Vasconcelos are known.

None of six others wounded by the shots from Flores' gun was injured seriously.

One Portland, Ore., society girl—Mrs. Taubles declines to give her name—battled the objections of parents and finally ran away to join the nurses corps. She was assigned to a hospital near the front line.

One night there was an air raid. "This American girl stayed at her post, going from bed to bed to comfort the soldiers, although other hospital attaches fled to bomb-proof cellars. As she reached the end of the ward a bomb hit in the middle of the building, blowing it to bits. Of the hundreds of beds on the floor, only five were left. And the nurse was standing by one of these remaining.

It also is said to think of the fate which awaits the young man who has sacrificed himself. He undoubtedly was exasperated to see his country dominated by brutal force. If he was a student as rumors indicate, it is natural that he should feel angered. During my presidential campaign, students and other unnamed civilians were shot down in Mexico City and elsewhere by congressmen and politicians directly protected by Portes Gil.

I hope for peace in Mexico, but I know that justice never comes without justice. So let us hope for justice first."
