Half-Sleeves Bring Worry Over Elbows

A little elbow oil, some elbow cream and plenty of elbow massage are recommended by couturiers and beauty specialists for women with bony or roughened elbows.

The half-sleeve ending just above the middle joint of the arm, is the most difficult of all sleeves. It is generally admitted, only the perfectly rounded, soft white arm can stand the elbow sleeve without a little assistance to nature.

Sitting for 15 minutes morning and evening with the elbows in little bowls of olive oil is part of the elbow culture recommended by one specialist.

After the oil comes massage. The soothing cream and liquid powder are applied.

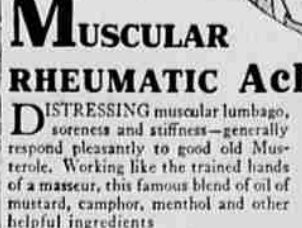
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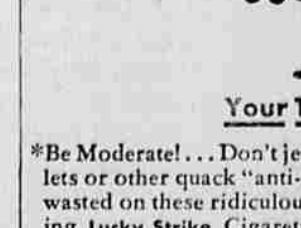
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
