Egg And Butter Prices Firmer In Oregon Mart

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 6 (AP)—Egg and butter quotations were firmer today, but no changes were announced. Supply and demand were more evenly balanced than for some time.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the United States department of agriculture says: "Limited volume of home-grown bunched carrots and green onions are appearing on the market again. These stocks are of better quality than the be-dragged condition of their above-ground portions would indicate. Spinach from nearby districts, and from Walla Walla, is expected within a week or so."
"A slight decline in lettuce prices is a direct reflection on weaker shipping-point conditions in the Imperial valley. Other California vegetables are in moderate supply, and prices are barely steady, an account of only ordinary quality of most of the present arrivals. Cauliflower continues barely steady, although quality is very good."
"Tomatoes advanced to \$5.50 per bag, but trading is limited."
"Total truck holdings of about 50 cars mark the heaviest volume of Portland team trucks in several months. Forty per cent of this total consists of potatoes however, and liberal California diversions are decreasing their volume of holdings, locally."

Wheat Gains In Late Dealings; Closing Is Firm

CHICAGO, Feb. 6 (AP)—In a rapidly fluctuating market wheat values here scored sharp upturns during the late dealings today. Commission houses became active buyers after an early rash of selling that forced prices down to new lows for the season.

Russia was reported to be trying to arrange foreign bank credits on offers of 250,000 tons of export wheat, but it was asserted in usually well-informed quarters that Russia has in reality no grain of consequence to spare and that her need is cash with which to purchase machinery.

Wheat closed firm 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 a bushel higher than yesterday's finish. Corn closed 1/4 to 1/2 c up; oats 1/2 to 1/4 c advance, and provisions, unchanged to a rise of 1/2 c.

Frequent Shifts In Wall Street

NEW YORK, Feb. 6 (AP)—Frequent shifting of speculative sentiment imparted considerable irregularity to today's stock market. Prices opened higher, then reacted sharply before mid-day when selling pressure was renewed against some of the high priced industrial specialties. Heavy buying of Fox Film and a selected group of utilities turned the course of prices upward again in the early afternoon.

Discount Rate In England Reduced

LONDON, Feb. 6 (AP)—The discount rate of the Bank of England was reduced today from five to four and one-half per cent.

The reduction was due to the recent inflow of gold and improvement of the national monetary situation which assisted recently in reductions of the bank rates of Germany and France.
