Parents of Memphis' Most Beautiful Girl Have Never Seen Her Face—They are Blind

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — Everyone else in Memphis may admire the beauty of Ruth Furr, 18, chosen as Memphis' most beautiful high school girl, but her parents cannot see their daughter's face—they never have and never will.

For both Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Furr are blind, and have been for their lifetimes.

When Ruth returned home from Homes high school the other day and told her mother she had just been elected the most beautiful high school girl, Mrs. Furr smiled and passed her sensitive fingers over her daughter's face.

"I know you are beautiful, honey, even though I can't see you," the mother said.

Every Sunday since she was three years old Ruth had led her mother by the hand to the Third Christian church, where Mrs. Furr, despite her blindness, is an organist.

"I don't judge beauty by physical appearance alone," Mrs. Furr said. "Real beauty is in the soul and in the personality. Ruth is a happy girl and she helps me around the house—makes me comfortable and

happy all the time. So I know she is beautiful." Blindness has not cast a shadow over the family. The home is happy and cheerful. Mr. Furr, Ruth's father, is not entirely blind—that is, he can see very slightly with

powerful glasses. Until a year ago he was in charge of a broom factory for the blind. Now he spends his days at home, living in his world of shadows and worshipping the beautiful daughter whose face he cannot see.

COACHES ARRIVE AT WASHINGTON

Cotton Wilcox and Pest Welch to Assist Jimmy Phelan Manage Huskies

By Frank G. Gorrie (Associated Press Sports Writer) SEATTLE, Feb. 7 (AP)—After a short layover, Seattle has again taken on a football atmosphere with the arrival of "Cotton" Wilcox and "Pest" Welch from Purdue university.

They are to help Washington's new head coach, Jimmy Phelan, in the construction of the Husky football team this year. Wilcox, former freshman mentor at Purdue, will handle the varsity backfield for two years. Welch, an all-American end on the champion Bulldogs' eleven last fall, will take charge of the Washington freshmen.

Phelan will be returning to Seattle soon to establish his home and get down to work. He will likely bring two more assistants with him. It was the belief for some time that Heasley Anderson, head coach at St. Louis, would be one of them. Since Phelan's return to Lafayette, Ind., reports have been current that Anderson might sign with Notre Dame as assistant to Knute Rockne. However, it is held out at Washington that Anderson will come west to handle the line for Phelan.

The fourth assistant will likely be announced in a few days. One man under consideration is a former all-American player at Notre Dame.

If Phelan doesn't accomplish anything else he will have added a lot of "color" to the Washington coaching staff.

Speaking of color the latest information to sift into Seattle about Phelan is that the Washington footballers will probably be outfitted in brilliant satin pants. Phelan believes in showmanship and that would be one way of carrying it out. Purdue won the "Big Ten" title last fall in satin pants.

No wonder Washington's new coach has requested Earl Campbell, graduate manager, to turf the stadium floor. He wouldn't want to spoil the show right at the start on a muddy day.

Washington officials are endeavoring to arrange an intercollegiate rowing regatta on Lake Washington here March 22 between the varsity crew of Oregon State college and two freshman eights of Washington. Plans are to race the second and third freshman shells against the Cougar varsity. Freshman Coach Tom Bolles does not care to race his first combination before sending it into the California regatta April 11.

Southern Coast Title Race Now Nearing The End

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 7 (AP)—The southern division football race of the Pacific Coast conference swings into the final stretch tonight with the University of California quintet meeting the University of California at Los Angeles five on the latter's home court.

The Bears left Berkeley last night, fifteen strong, and ready to take on the Bruins. The teams will meet tonight and tomorrow night, and on the results of the fray will hinge to a great extent, the southern division winner. A double victory for either team will eliminate the other from consideration, while even a split will probably ruin the chances of both.

One other game is scheduled for this weekend, with the division leader, Southern California, taking on the last place Stanford Cardinal. The two teams divided their last two meetings, and while the Southerners are favored to win Saturday night, a win for Stanford is entirely possible.

Portland Leading In Hockey League

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 7 (AP)—Portland today had returned to undisputed possession of the Pacific coast ice hockey league leadership as a result of a 2 to 2 tie victory over the leafless Victoriaawks at the Coliseum here last night.

Carnera Knocks Out Cherokee In Second Stanza

By Herbert W. Barker (Associated Press Sports Writer) NEW YORK, Feb. 7 (AP)—There are no figures to prove it, but the suspicion grows that Primo Carnera, Venetian carpenter, will be the highest paid athlete in the United States within almost as short a time as it takes to tell it.

The giant Italian heavyweight knocked out Cowboy Billy Owens, Cherokee Indian from Guthrie, Okla., in three minutes and 25 seconds of fighting at Newark last night and boosted his total earnings in America to somewhere between \$40,000 and \$45,000.

Carnera has made three ring appearances since he came to this country and knocked out three men in total ring time of five minutes 27 seconds. That makes his earnings average approximately \$5,000 for every minute he spent in the ring.

Owens made a better showing than either of Carnera's previous opponents although that may have been because the Italian was inclined to clown his way through the first round. The Italian knocked out Big Boy Peterson in Philadelphia, 10 seconds of fighting in his first match here and lost Elmer Chicago of Canada in 47 seconds at Chicago last Friday night. Owens lasted 7 minutes, 25 seconds.

Eight thousand persons jammed their way into the Newark armory and watched Carnera abandon his usual formula of getting his man as quickly as possible. The nubby-nip moved about the ring with great speed, boxing with Owens, wrestling his man around in the clinch when he wasn't knocking all the punches the red man aimed at him. Toward the end of the round Carnera sent home several hard punches to the head and body but Owens took them without flinching.

As the second round opened, Primo landed both hands heavily to the Indian's head. Owens' knees buckled and he went down on his shoulders as a heavy right caught him on the chin. The count of ten found Owens writhing on the floor and Carnera a victor in his third straight match.

Carnera weighed 276; Owens 220.

SEATTLE, Feb. 7 (AP)—Wallace Lindsley of Mount Vernon, Wash., won the Pacific northwest amateur three cushion billiard championship here last night from Jerry White of Seattle, 59 to 48, in a playoff match. The contest lasted 86 minutes.

CATERING TO CANNIBALISTIC TRAIT OF FISH

OLYMPIA, Wash. (AP)—Catering to the cannibalistic traits of young salmon, the state division of fisheries canned 246,500 pounds of spawned-out salmon last season to feed to the young fish this year.

The pack, which will feed some 55,000,000 fry, cost the state but \$2,250, a report of L. E. Maghall, hatchery superintendent, to Charles H. Maybury director of fisheries and game, showed today.

The spawned-out salmon were packed in six pound cans by three small portable canneries which the state purchased last fall. Sixteen thousand cans were packed on the Klamath river in 18 days while 25,000 were canned in 90 days at Green river. The balance came from the Samish hatchery.

The pack will be distributed to the state's ten salmon hatcheries where the young fry are expected to devour 185,000 pounds. The home-canned salmon will take the place of condemned salmon on which the fish have been fed since 1922 when 20,000 cases were purchased.

Besides old ponds still in use, the present rearing system includes 75 concrete ponds. These are 20 feet wide and 30 feet long. Each has a capacity of half a million young salmon. More than a ton of food is needed for every pond.

The 1936 distribution of the canned food among hatcheries as outlined is: Green river 55,000 pounds; Klamath, 42,000; Willapa, 21,000; Chinook, 17,000; Skiyahish, 13,000; Chehalis, 13,000; Samish, 9,000; Puyallup river, 5,000; Puget Sound, 5,000 and Nasel river, 5,000.

Scarlet Fever Is Serious Disease

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)—With 54 cases of scarlet fever reported in the state, Dr. Frederick D. Stricker, secretary of the state board of health, has issued a warning that "scarlet fever is one of the most dangerous of children's diseases and every effort should be made to prevent its spread."

He pointed out that last year there were 1249 cases reported in the state and 17 deaths among children.

HIGH SCHOOL ORCHESTRA TO PLAY IN TWO GROUPS

CHICAGO (AP)—The national high school orchestra, recruited from the best musical talent in the high schools of the United States, will split into two sections in 1936 for the initial concert.

After that, a specially selected group of about 200 will go on tour. The first section will play in Atlantic City the last week in February under the direction of Walter Damrosch and J. E. Maddy. The second section will play in Chicago the latter part of March, directed by J. E. Maddy and Frederick Stock.

The selected touring section will give concerts in Philadelphia, February 27, in New York February 28, and in Washington March 1. Each section of the primary orchestra will be made up of about 200 high school musicians.
