**Veal and Pork Price Cut; Eggs, Butter Steady**

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 8 (AP)—Egg and butter quotations were steady today, with butter supplies reported to have increased considerably. Trade also was reported to be more vigorous with shipments to the north partially offsetting the liberal receipts.  
Because of liberal supplies, veal and pork prices have been reduced. The former declined two cents to 17 1/2¢ and the latter 12¢ to 14 1/2¢.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the United States department of agriculture says:  
"Volume of trading on the wholesale market was moderate, and arriving in limited volume from local acreage and from Walla Walla. Quality of this spinach is fair—about on a level with California offerings."  
"Lettuce and potato markets have steadied, after several days of instability and slight weakness. Shipments of both these important commodities have been heavy this week, but retailers' demands have also been liberal."

"Shipments of wrapped and graded apples from the northwest have been heavy this week, partially as a result of elimination of cheaper sorts from the market. Retailers' demands for good apples has also been fairly active."

**STOCK MARKET TURNS STRONG AT THE CLOSE**

NEW YORK, Feb. 8 (AP)—The stock market turned strong just before the close today when a brisk demand developed for the railroad, public utility, amusement and tobacco shares, many of which were marked up 1 to 5 1/2 points. Early declines of 1 to 3 points in many other issues were cut down, or wiped out.  
There was nothing in the day's news to explain the sudden reversal in speculative sentiment. Weekly trade reviews were rather cautious in tone, and there were indications of a flowing up in some of the industries which have been showing sharp recovery since the middle of January, particularly steel. Weekly market reviews, however, leaned to the opinion that the recent reduction in interest rates would stimulate business, particularly building construction which has been held up by the high rates for mortgage money.  
Union Pacific assumed leadership of the railroad group by soaring 5 1/2 points.  
The closing was strong, total sales approximated 1,600,000 shares.

**Wheat Irregular And Lower Today**  
CHICAGO, Feb. 8 (AP)—Affected by lower quotations at Liverpool and by reports of only poor demand there, Chicago wheat prices showed an irregular downward trend early today. Buying of future deliveries here came chiefly from previous speculative sellers who were in a position to collect profits. Opening at 5 to 1 1/2¢, Chicago wheat rallied somewhat but then sagged again. Corn and oats also were easy, with corn starting 1/2¢ to 3/4¢ down, and subsequently keeping near to the initial range. Provisions advanced. Wheat closed irregular at 3 1/2¢ net decline to 1/4¢ advance compared with yesterday's finish. Corn closed 1/2¢ to 3/4¢ up, oats a shade lower to 1/2¢ higher and provisions showing 2 to 7¢ gain.

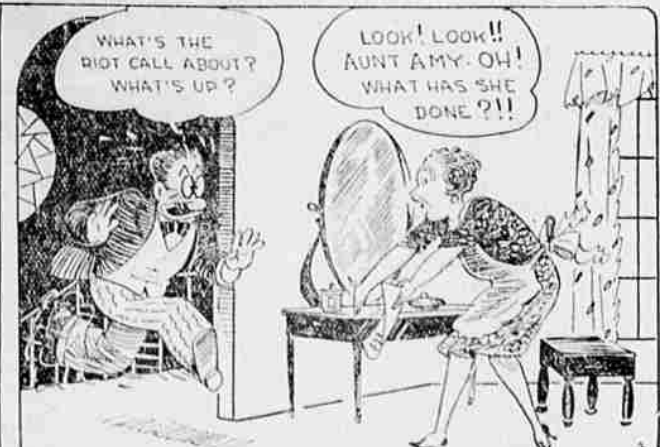

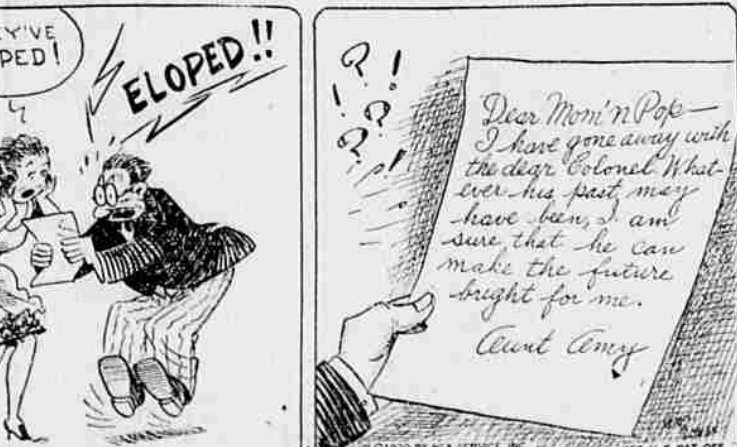
