Health Talks

TOOLS OF THE TRADE

Each trade has its proper tools, some of which serve as its trade mark. In medicine, it is the stethoscope that serves as its most common symbol.

Next to his proverbial five senses the most common instrument employed by the physician is the stethoscope. On duty or off, he is seldom without it. And yet this tool of the trade is relatively of recent origin. Its invention dates from 1816, a little over 100 years ago.

In 1816 a young woman suffering from heart trouble consulted Dr. Laennec, then at the famous Necker hospital in Paris.

The young woman was fat and moose. The doctor was at a loss as to how to examine her. Little could be gained by thumping her chest, and her youth and modesty made the application of the ear directly to her body somewhat embarrassing.

In this dilemma, necessity, the prolific mother of invention, proved fruitful once more. The doctor recalled a simple and very common experience which he had shared with thousands of other boys, but which none had thought of applying in this connection.

Boys often amuse themselves by taking a long stick and while one end is placed at the ear the other end is scratched with a pin or scribble. The stick naturally conveys the sounds in a loud form.

Dr. Laennec, remembering this fact, simply rolled a piece of paper

into a kind of hollow cone. The broad end he applied over the patient's chest; the pointed end he stuck into his ear.

Anal as he expected, he not only heard the heart sounds clearly, but better even than he would have heard them by applying the ear to the patient's chest.

With this simple instrument, later made out of hollow bamboo, Laennec carried on an extensive study of the sounds of the chest both in health and disease.

By Williams Wool Directors Will Meet Tonight

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 10 (AP)—Formal acceptance of the new national wool marketing program and the acquisition of stock in the national wool marketing corporation probably will be voted at the first meeting of the 1930 board of directors of the Pacific Cooperative Wool Growers today.

All obstacles to the acceptance of the national plan have been removed by changes in the organization papers as suggested by the retiring board of directors. It was announced.

The directors also will vote on enlarging the Pacific Wool Growers' Credit corporation, operated in connection with the wool marketing association to enable it to handle \$20,000,000 worth of production loans on sheep and other livestock.

The board of directors is composed of wool growers from Oregon, Washington, Idaho and California. Members include Carl Whitmore, of Joseph, Ore.
