There were 77,551 arrests for violation, alleged or real. "During the first year under prohibition there were 2,900 cases instituted, and during the last full year there were close to 79,000."

Denial of published reports that merger negotiations were under way involving 80 per cent of the Pacific northwest lumber resources was issued categorically by James Tyson, president of the Charles Nelson Lumber company.
