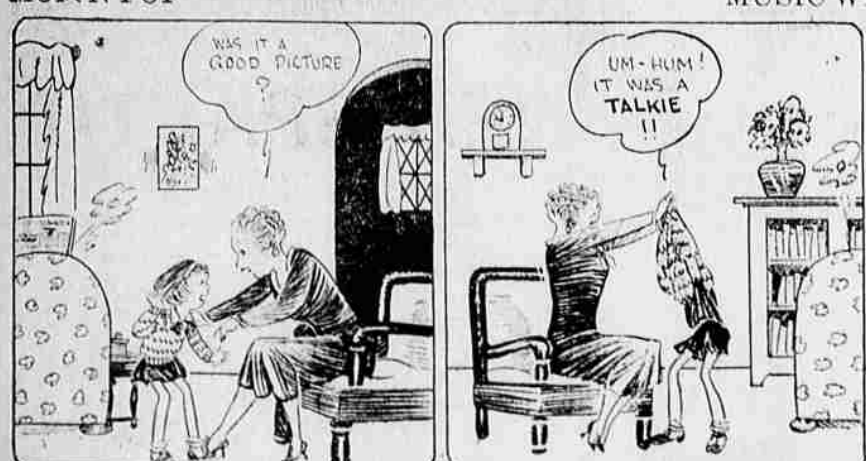

HOT SOUP IS BENEFICIAL TO SCHOOL CHILD

ROSEBURG, Ore. (AP)—Hot soup or some other hot dish served to school children who carry their

lunches to school is a great aid to school attendance and child health, according to tests conducted by the National School Lunch Association.

The organization decided to experiment for a period of five weeks in the grade school in which it is particularly interested, to determine the relative value of a warm meal. Women residing in the immediate vicinity of the school took turns providing hot soup or hot drinks at noon for children, who would otherwise have a cold lunch and a check was made on the attendance.

For the sake of the experiment, the project was started just at the beginning of the severe cold weather. It was found that the attendance during the cold weather remained at the normal figure and the school carried off the banner presented each month for punctuality and attendance.

It is planned to carry on the activity and at the same time the association is offering a prize to the room in which the highest percentage of students report a hot cereal breakfast for each morning.

Hot meals for high school students are provided in the high school cafeteria, maintained by the domestic art classes, but no attention has been made previously to provide hot food for children in the grade schools.
