RAILROAD HEAD HOPEFUL

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 18 (AP)—Ralph Budd, president of the Great Northern railroad, here yesterday, said he was hopeful the interstate commerce commission would decide favorably on the two important rail construction projects in which his company is interested so that active construction would start this spring.

They are the Santiam extension of the Oregon Electric railway from Lebanon into the west slopes of the Cascades and the physical connection of the Great Northern from Klamath Falls south with the Western Pacific from the Feather river, California, north.

GOVERNMENT FINDS \$4,000 IN TRIO OF DEAD LETTERS

WASHINGTON (AP)—Three mislabeled letters that arrived at the dead letter division of the postoffice in Washington brought government coffers \$4,000.

The letters contained bills of like denomination and were received within a few hours of each other. The addresses indicated they were penned by the same person, probably a woman.

All efforts failed to locate the sender or the persons to whom the letters were addressed.

ASSAULTED FINED \$50

RAINIER, Ore., Feb. 18 (AP)—A fine of \$50 and costs was assessed against John W. L. Smith, former instructor in the Smith-Hughes vocational work of the Rainier Union High school yesterday when he pleaded guilty to a charge of assault preferred by G. D. Myers, school principal.

Smith struck Myers over the head with a school trophy two weeks after Smith's son, Ivan, had been expelled.

SENTENCE DUE WEDNESDAY

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 18 (AP)—S. C. Herlinger, former clerk in the city water bureau, will be sentenced Wednesday for stealing public funds.

He pleaded guilty yesterday to a charge of larceny of public funds for which he was indicted by the county grand jury. Herlinger had been an employee of the water bureau 16 years. His thefts ranged as high as \$10,000.

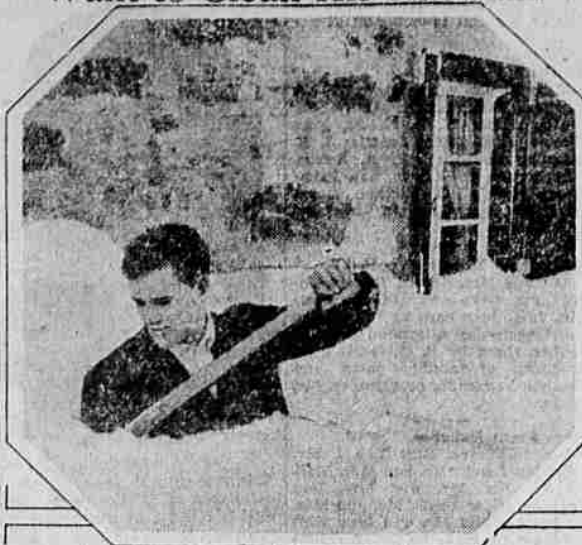

MENUS

Recent investigations and experiments have placed grape juice in the list of particularly healthful foods. Its mineral content is of great value from the standpoint of nutrition.

Every home-maker knows the problem of providing the necessary mineral salts during the winter months. The heavier foods demanded to produce heat in the body make the use of a generous amount of mineral salts imperative. Certain fruit juices tend to decrease the acidity produced when much meat is eaten, and grape juice is one of the best for this purpose.

Simple puddings made with grape juice can be given to children and they help to vary the menu.

The following cornstarch pudding is suitable for children, but will be liked by grown-ups as well.

Grape Juice-Cornstarch Pudding

Two cups grape juice, 1-3 cup cornstarch, 1 dessertspoon butter, 1-2 cup sugar, whites 2 eggs.

Dilute cornstarch with enough cold water to pour easily. Heat grape juice and sugar and cornstarch, stir in prepared cornstarch. Add butter and cook, stirring constantly until thick and transparent. Remove from fire and fold in whites of eggs beaten until stiff and dry. Turn into a mold and put on ice to chill and become firm. Serve with a custard sauce made with the yolks of the eggs.

Grape Juice Bavarian

Grape juice Bavarian is simple but delicious enough for a party dessert. If white grape juice is used, the effect is particularly attractive with a garnish of red cherries. Purple grape juice makes a delicate colored pudding that is most inviting, garnished with blanched pistachio nuts. Here is the recipe:

Three-fourths cup grape juice, juice 1-2 lemon, 1-2 cup sugar, 1 tablespoon granulated gelatin, 1 tablespoon cold water, white 1 egg, 1-2 cup whipping cream, few grains salt.

Soften gelatin in cold water for five minutes. Dissolve over hot water. Heat grape juice and sugar enough to dissolve sugar. Remove from fire and add lemon juice and gelatin. Let cool while beating white of egg until stiff and dry. Fold into a gelatin. Fold in cream whipped until firm with salt. Turn into a mold and let stand several hours until firm and thoroughly chilled. Serve in sherbet glasses and garnish as wanted.

FORMER MAYOR PASSES

GRANT'S PASS, Ore., Feb. 18 (AP)—Dr. W. H. Flanagan, former mayor of Grants Pass and past right eminent grand commander of the Grand Commandery of Oregon, died here today. He was 75 years old and was a thirty-third degree Mason. He had been active in civic affairs of Josephine county since 1884.

HELD TO GRAND JURY

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 18 (AP)—Mike Relich, whose second arrest by federal prohibition officers is held responsible for the "shake-up" in the Portland police department, was held to the grand jury yesterday on a charge of setting up and operating a still. Bail was raised from \$1500 to \$2000.

Relich was arrested after he had served but three days of a six months jail sentence on a liquor charge. His release was said to have been arranged through Chief of Police Jenkins, now Commissioner Jenkins.
