On this flight he circled over an expanse of 40,000 square miles.

Three members of the party, Bernt Balchen, chief-pilot, Larry Gould and Harold June, were marooned by a severe storm in the Rockefeller mountain range, when the plane in which they had flown was torn from its moorings and wrecked by the wind. They had flown to the mountains on March 8 to make geological observations.

Admiral Byrd flew to their rescue and brought them out on March 22, after which the approach of the long Antarctic winter night forced suspension of operations.

headquarters at Little America.

After the bases were down a party of scientists made a 400-mile trip by dog-sled into the Queen Maude mountains where they established a camp and undertook geological exploration.

On November 28 Admiral Byrd with three companions set out in the big plane on a flight to the pole. The plane reached the pole after a flight of about 10 hours, arriving there at 8:55 a. m. (Eastern Standard time) on November 29. The return flight to the base was made the same day. No landing was attempted at the pole.

In recognition of his flight over the South Pole, which made him the only man to have flown over both poles, a bill was enacted by congress raising Commander Byrd to the rank of rear admiral.

Butter, Flour Prices Drop In Portland Today

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 20 (AP)—Butter, butterfat and flour prices took the toboggan for material declines today.

Butter of all grades went down 2c, butterfat 3c and flour 2 1/2c a barrel. Butter extras were quoted at 34c, butterfat at 35c delivered Portland and family patent flour at \$7.40.

Bag prices were unchanged, but the undertone was weak.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the United States department of agriculture says:

"Lettuce shipments of 231 cars from the Imperial valley mark the greatest daily volume from that district in the entire history of the valley. The lettuce market is weak, but not yet demoralized, as has usually been the case with 250-car shipments from that district. Twenty-one cars of lettuce were on track at Portland yesterday, prices are cheap, and active local distribution is being obtained.

"Although potato landings still total 709-800 cars daily, much difficulty is being experienced in the Yakima valley, on account of muddy roads which prohibit hauling in many sections. The market at Yakima advanced sharply to \$45.00 per ton for stock grading, 50 per cent U. S. No. 1, while 60 per cent stock brought \$40.00.

"The onion market is weak, some stock is being consigned by Lahain district growers, and Oregon distributors are working overtime, trying to find satisfactory outlets for current loadings.

"Roseburg cauliflower shows much improvement over earlier harvestings, and now sells on a par with California stock. Spinach is barely steady, California asparagus declined further, to 25c per lb. to retailers.

"Hothouse cucumbers grown in Oregon are again on the market, after a two months absence."
