SALT LAKE CITY, Feb. 22 (AP)—The body of Mrs. Frank Moormeister, wife of a Salt Lake physician, was found this morning on a lonely country road near Granbury, 10 miles from this city. She had been struck on the head and then run over many times with an automobile. Several thousand dollars worth of jewelry which Mrs. Moormeister habitually wore had been stolen, sheriff's officers reported. The woman's automobile, blood-stained, was found on a street here later. Fragments of ore found in her hat led the officers to assume the rock was the weapon used by her assailant.

PLAN 60 CANCER BEDS

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 22 (AP)—Sixty beds for cancer patients will be established at the San Francisco hospital at a cost of \$20,000 if the board of supervisors act favorably next Monday on the recommendation of its finance committee. The committee's action came as the result of a plea by Dr. William C. Hassler, city health officer, who said that cancer sufferers from all parts of the country are flocking to San Francisco for the newly discovered coffee-humber treatment.
