In La Grande—C. H. Record, Baker miner and inventor, was in La Grande yesterday on a business trip. He stated that he intends to leave for Denver within the next two days for the purpose of demonstrating his amalgamator and classifier, which he perfected in October, 1929. If successful in his tests, he said that he has orders for a number of the machines. He recently tested the invention out at the Gotville (Cal.) Mercury mine successfully, the machine saving 97 per cent of free mercury out of the mill run. This, Mr. Record says, compares with less than 50 per cent saved by methods now in use. He said that he has secured San Francisco financial backing for manufacture of his amalgamators.

RESCUE DIVER FROM CHILLY OTTAWA RIVER—PITZBERY HARBOR, Ont., Feb. 25 (AP)—Hector Roy, a diver, was recovering today from the effects of five hours imprisonment beneath the icy waters of the Ottawa river. He was drawn into a deep hole in the river bottom yesterday and held there by a strong current when he went down to work on a cofferdam being constructed in connection with a hydro-power development at Chat's Fall.

Six Known Dead In English Fires—LONDON, Feb. 25 (AP)—Six persons are known to be dead, several are missing and many were injured in fires which occurred today in Luton, Bedfordshire, and in Glasgow, Scotland. The Luton blaze was in a large hat factory employing 150 persons, mostly women and girls. It is known four girls are dead and it is feared other bodies may be in the wreckage.
