Health Talks

ROMANCE OF THE BODY What is the living human body made of? What are plants and animals composed of? These questions have puzzled the mind of man for countless centuries, and from time to time a variety of answers were given. The ancients believed that the human body was composed of four elements, earth, fire, water and air. Health was dependent upon the proper balance and proportion of these elements. Disease resulted from a derangement of this balance. But all of their conjectures were based upon fancy and illusion. No definite knowledge could have been secured concerning the constitution and the composition of human, animal and vegetable bodies until the discovery and perfection of the microscope and the development of the modern science of chemistry. The microscope was invented in the seventeenth century. At first it was merely a scientific toy to be used by curious scientists and dilettantes. Later, it was applied to more purposeful ends. Robert Hooke, an erratic genius who touched on many scientific fields but exploited none to perfection, was the first to observe what today is recognized as the biologic cell. Studying a thin shaving of cork under his microscope, he noticed that it was made up of many little cube-like structures. Because these structures were approximately square shaped he called them cells. Two scientists by the name of Schleiden and Schwann in 1838 established the fact that, structurally, all known living things are composed of one or many of these tiny called cells. The human body is made up of countless billions of cells, each cell a living unit containing a basic substance common to all life and known as protoplasm.

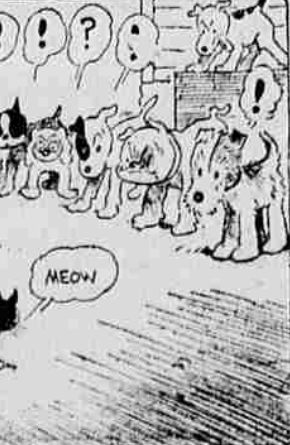
