Butter Prices
Up Three Cents;
Eggs, Flour Drop

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 25 (AP)—Butter prices went up, while eggs and flour quotations declined today.

Extra and standards in butter each made a leap of 3c and the lower grades ascended 1c and 2c. Butterfat was up 3c.

All grades of eggs hit the tobacconist for recessions of 2c each, making the price of fresh extra to retailers 26c.

Flour prices were off 20c in keeping with the descending wheat market.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the United States department of agriculture says:

"Liberal supplies of southern vegetables, and active movement to retailers, which resulted from generally lower prices, characterized the wholesale fruit and vegetable market."

"Price declines were registered in celery, carrots, cauliflower, lettuce and spinach. Onions are dull. Anadarko stock of fair quality sold to retailers as low as \$1.25-\$1.50 per cwt. Local cabbage stocks are generally rather poor, and supplies are light. Limited volume of southern cabbage is resulting in sales to retailers as high as \$5.50 per cwt., for best Imperial valley cannonball type."

"The Imperial valley again established an all-time record volume of lettuce loadings last Friday, with 253 cars forwarded from the district. Voluntary curtailment over the weekend, with practically no loadings, was successfully effected, to stabilize the lettuce market."

"Willamette valley points continue to ship considerable volume of ungraded apples of rather poor quality and condition to Portland; but local dealers state that this week should witness the termination of this movement to a large extent."

VICTIM OF GANG GUNS FOUND GARY, Ind., Feb. 25 (AP)—The reason Paul Percini failed to telephone his wife last Tuesday afternoon at 5:30 o'clock was because he was dead, shot to death, a victim of the Durdand gang.

They found his body late yesterday, buried in a quick lime crypt sealed with freshly poured cement under the floor of an abandoned barn 12 miles east of Gary. The finding of Percini's bloodstained cap and revolver had prompted the search in that neighborhood.

Always when absent from home Percini telephoned his wife hourly. It is a usual practice among members of gangs who never can be sure their time has not been set by rival gangsters. When he failed to call last Tuesday afternoon, his wife feared he had been killed. A few hours later she notified police of his absence.

REFUSES TO "SNITCH" DETROIT, Feb. 25 (AP)—Refusing to name his assailants or make any statement regarding his shooting, Roy Gennaro, 25, died at receiving hospital today apparently the victim of a gangster execution.

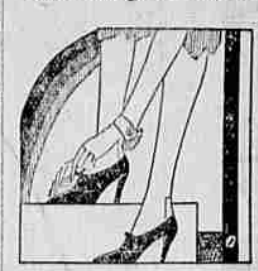
