Eggs And Butter More Stable Today

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 26 (AP)—Eggs and butter prices appeared to have reached a more stable basis, at least temporarily, when the market opened today. Eggs were somewhat firmer in the face of smaller receipts and butter seemed stimulated by a brisk demand.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the United States department of agriculture says:

"Movement of southern vegetables continues active, with prices generally low on account of prevalent heavy supplies. Few price changes were made today, except tomatoes, which lowered to \$4.00 to \$4.25 per lug of repacked Mexican."

"Movement of Oregon onions continues slow, at \$1.50 to \$1.75 per cwt. to retailers."

"Potato loadings from Yakima valley points increased again yesterday, to 65 cars. Potato prices have shown no variation on the Portland market during the last three months."
