### THOMAS GENTLE IS SPEAKER AT NORMAL SCHOOL

The college and university have undergone great changes, Dr. Gentle added. He described the old-fashioned family council meetings which were held to decide which children of a large family would be sent to college. short. The police front stood firm, and the uprising quieted rapidly as leaders of the rioters were loaded into patrol wagons and ambulances. Several required emergency treatment before they could be booked at police headquarters.

A score of police officers were blinded by fumes from their own tear bombs. D. M. Jones, "millionaire patrolman," was struck down by a club in the hands of a fellow officer. Jones, who recently rejoined the police force after inheriting a fortune, was knocked unconscious, but was given emergency treatment, and will recover.

Leader Arrested  
Sklar and Frank Specter, alleged communist leaders, were arrested during the rioting and with others of their lieutenants several of them women, were hurried to the police station.

Long after the battle had ended the plaza and surrounding streets still were filled with people, but the crowds remained orderly. Double guards of officers patrolled the district to prevent further outbreaks. Mayor John C. Porter, who was in his office in the city hall during the uprising, refused the offer of an armed escort to quit the building.
